Your R520 is a **Triple Band** phone (GSM 900/1800/1900), which means that you can use it almost all over the world. It contains a whole new set of functions helping you to be more efficient and productive, no matter where you are.

The R520 supports **GPRS** (General Packet Radio Services), which means data is sent in packages at a very high speed. This is of great advantage when using the **WAP** browser, for example, since you can be connected all the time, yet pay only for the amount of data that you download. **HSCSD** (High Speed Circuit Switched Data) is yet another feature which enables faster data connections


The R520 offers built-in **BluetoothTM** wireless technology. Short-range radio links make it possible for you to connect your phone wirelessly to other *Bluetooth* devices such as a headset, PC, PDA, printer and so on. You can synchronize meetings and contacts in your phone and your PC.


The advanced Calendar helps you to keep track of your meetings. You can create a phone book of Contacts in which you can save multiple numbers and voice labels for each person. You can write text messages more quickly and easily by using the T9 Text Input. The advanced Voice Control enables completely handsfree communication, using the Magic Word function. The Speakerphone is another handsfree alternative.





Preparing Your Phone





Assembly

You need to do the following to use your phone:


- insert the SIM card.
- attach and charge the battery.

SIM Card

Your network operator provides you with a SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card. The SIM card contains information about your phone number, the services included in your subscription, and your phone book, among other things.

Note: Turn off the phone and disconnect the charger and other accessories before you insert or remove your SIM card.

Inserting and Removing the SIM Card




- 1. Remove the battery if attached. Slide the SIM card into the slot, under the silvery holders, with the golden connectors facing down.
- 2. To remove it, raise the edge of the SIM card and slide it out.

Battery

Your phone comes with a lithium battery. The battery is not charged when you buy your phone, but there may be enough power to turn the phone on.

Attaching the Battery




Place the battery on the back of the phone and push until you hear a click.

When to Charge the Battery

You can charge the battery that comes with your phone whenever you wish, without its performance being affected. You can also charge the battery when the phone is off. To remind you that you will soon need to charge the battery or replace it with a charged one:

- an alarm signal (a short beep) sounds and Attention! Battery low appears in the display.
- the indicator light on top of the phone starts flashing red.

With an Ericsson-approved battery, you can check the remaining talk time and standby time in the **Status** menu by sliding the volume key up or down in standby mode. The total remaining talk time and standby time may vary, depending on network conditions. Please note that these times are approximate and that you may have 10% less time than is shown in the display.



- 1. Make sure that the battery is attached to the phone.
- 2. Connect the charger to the mains.
- Connect the charger to the phone as shown. The flash symbol on the plug must face upwards.

Note: The mains plug may look different depending on the mains socket in your country. Do not connect it to any item other than your Ericsson Travel Charger CTR-10. Do not separate the charger from the plug when plugged into the mains socket.

To indicate charging:

- the battery meter in the display pulses continuously.
- the indicator on top of the phone shows a steady red light (or green, if the phone is switched on).
- Optimized charging is shown briefly in the display.



Note: It may take several minutes before you get an indication of charging in the display, if you charge a new battery that is empty, or a battery that has not been used for a long time.

When the battery is fully charged, the battery meter in the display is full and the indicator on top of the phone shows a steady green light.

For the best charging, talk and standby times in the long run, we recommend that you use only Ericsson-approved batteries with your phone.

Disconnecting the Charger

Tilt the plug up.



Removing the Battery



1. Slide the release catch up.



2. Lift the battery away from the phone.


The Clip

By using the clip with your phone, you can hang your phone, for example, on your trousers or shirt.

To use the clip with your phone



1. Open the clip and slide it down.




2. Close the clip to attach it.



3. Remove the rubber plug.



4. Insert and fasten the screw.



5. Slide the phone into the clip until you hear a click.



6. Press the release catch and move the phone up to detach it from the clip.

Making Calls

Before you can make and receive calls, you need to turn on the phone and be within range of a network.

Turning Your Phone On

• Press and hold the **NO** key until you hear a tone.

The PIN

Most SIM cards are protected with a PIN (Personal Identity Number), which you get from your network operator and which you need in order to access the network. If **PIN**: appears in the display after you have turned on the phone:

- 1. Enter your PIN. If you make a mistake while entering your PIN, delete the wrong number by pressing ©.
- Press YES.

If your PIN is entered incorrectly three times in a row, the SIM card is blocked. If this happens, you can unblock it by using your PUK (Personal Unblocking Key), which you also get from your network operator. See "Locking the SIM Card" on page 96.

If **Phone locked** appears in the display, enter your phone lock code. See "Locking the Phone" on page 97.

Network Search

After you have turned on the phone (and entered your PIN), the phone searches for a network. When a network is found, the phone beeps three times. The indicator light on top of the phone flashes green and your network operator's name (in most cases abbreviated) appears in the display. This is called standby mode. You can now make and receive calls.

Note: If you do not reach standby mode, see "Error Messages" on page 114 or "Searching for Networks" on page 93.

Making a Call

- 1. Enter the area code and phone number (note that some countries may not use area codes).
 - You can edit the number before calling by pressing <a> <a> <a> .
- 2. Press YES.



3. Press **NO** to end the call.

Using the Call List

The numbers that you have dialled are always saved in the **Call list**. If your subscription includes the Calling Line Identification (CLI) service and the caller's network sends the number, you will also find the numbers (together with a name if saved in your phone book) of answered and missed calls in the call list. If the incoming call is a restricted number, the display shows **Withheld**. If the incoming call is an unknown number, the display shows **Unknown**.

You can delete a number by pressing *C*, **YES**.

The call list saves:

The last 30 incoming and outgoing calls are saved together in chronological order. The last call made is saved in first position. If the same number is called more than once, the latest call replaces earlier ones. If you check a call within 24 hours, the time of the call is displayed. Otherwise, the time is replaced by the date.

To call a number from the call list

- 1. Press **YES** from standby mode.
- Press or or of until the number you want to call is highlighted. You can edit the number before calling by pressing
- 3. Press YES.

Note: You can also find the Call list in the Call info menu. Depending on whether a call is ongoing or not, either the Call info menu or the Ongoing call menu is shown.

To clear the call list

- 1. Press until you reach the **Call info** menu.
 - 2. Press vuntil the **Options** sub-menu is highlighted, press **YES**.
 - 3. Press vuntil the Clear call list sub-menu is highlighted, press YES.
 - 4. The question **Call list Clear?** appears. Press **YES** to clear the call list.

In the **Set call list** sub-menu in **Options**, you can turn the call list on or off. If you select **Off**, you are asked to clear the call list.

Automatic Re-Dialling

If the connection failed when you first called, the display shows **Retry?**. You can now re-dial the number by pressing **YES**. Your phone automatically re-dials (up to ten times):

- until the call is successfully connected. You hear a ring signal.
- until you press a key or receive a call.

Note: Automatic re-dialling is not available for data calls.

Making International Calls

- Press and hold the 0 key until a + sign appears.
 The + replaces the international prefix of the country from which you are calling.
- 2. Enter the country code, area code (without the leading zero) and phone number.
- 3. Press YES.

Making Emergency Calls

Enter the international emergency number 112 and press YES.

Your Ericsson phone supports the international emergency numbers, 112, 911 and 08. This means that these numbers can normally be used to make an emergency call in any country, with or without a SIM card inserted, if a GSM network is within range.

Note: Some network operators may require that a SIM card is inserted, and in some cases that the PIN has been entered as well.

In some countries, other emergency numbers may also be promoted. Your operator may therefore save additional *local* emergency numbers on the SIM card.

To view your local emergency numbers

- 1. Press () to go to the **Phone book** menu.
- 2. Press until **Special numbers** is highlighted, press **YES**.
- 3. Press until **SOS numbers** is highlighted, press **YES**.

Showing and Hiding Your Number

Some operators offer subscriptions where your phone number can be hidden. You can choose to show or hide your number for a particular call, if your subscription supports the Calling Line Identification Restriction (CLIR) service.





To hide or show your phone number

- 1. Enter the phone number you wish to call.
- 2. Press (3).
- 3. Press until **Hide my number** or **Show my numb.** is highlighted.
- 4. Press YES to make the call.

Receiving a Call

When you receive a call, the phone rings and the display shows **Answer?**

If your subscription includes the Calling Line Identification (CLI) service and the caller's network sends the number, the caller's number appears in the display. If the incoming call is a restricted number, the display shows **Withheld**. If the incoming call is an unknown number, the display shows **Unknown**.

Answering a Call

Press YES to answer the call.

Rejecting a Call

• Slide the volume key on the side of the phone twice, or press NO. The display shows Busy tone. The caller hears a busy tone if this is supported by the caller's subscription. If the When busy divert function is on, the call is diverted to the number you have specified. See "Diverting Calls" on page 85.

Missed Calls

If you have missed a call, the message **Missed calls: 1** appears in standby mode, where the number, in this case **1**, indicates the number of missed calls.

- 1. Press **YES** to display the missed calls.
- 2. Press **YES** to call the number.

Tip! You can also see the missed calls list in the Call info menu. Missed calls are also saved in the call list.

Turning Your Phone Off

• In standby mode, press and hold the **NO** key until you hear a tone.

During a Call

Earpiece Volume

During a call, you can change the earpiece volume by sliding the volume key on the side of the phone.

- Slide up to increase the volume.
- Slide down to decrease the volume.

Microphone

During a call, you can turn off the microphone.

- Press and hold until Muted appears in the display.
- Press and hold © again to resume the conversation.

Tip: Instead of pressing and holding , you can put the call on hold by pressing **YES**.

Speakerphone

You can use your phone as a speakerphone during a call, for example when you want others to participate in a conversation or when you need to have your hands free during the call. We recommend that you use the speakerphone in a quiet environment.

To turn the speakerphone on or off

- 1. During a call or in standby, press (3).
- Press until Act. Speaker or Deact. Speaker is highlighted, press YES.

When the speakerphone is on, an icon appears.

Warning! While the speakerphone is on, do not hold the phone close to your ear as this may cause damage to your hearing. Hold the phone about 30 - 50 cm in front of your face and speak into the microphone.

The speakerphone is not available when you use your phone together with any handsfree equipment or when the IR port is on.



The speakerphone is always turned off when a call is ended. For safety reasons, the speakerphone is automatically turned off when the phone is approximately 10 cm from your ear or another object during a call.



Notepad

If you want to make a note of a phone number during a call, you can use your phone display as a notepad. Use the number keys to enter the number. When you end the call, the number remains in the display. You can call the number by pressing **YES**.

Turn Off Tones

If you use the phone display as a notepad, the person you are talking to hears the tone signals when you press the keys.

To turn the tone signals on or off

- 1. During a call, press .
- Press until Turn off tones or Turn on tones is highlighted, press YES.

Sending Touch Tone Signals

To use touch tone services such as telephone banking or controlling an answering machine, you need to use codes. These codes are sent as touch tone signals (also known as DTMF – Dual Tone Multiple Frequency tones). If you press 0-9, \bullet and \bullet during a call, these numbers and characters are sent as tone signals. You can save codes in your phone book, and during a call, you can send the codes by pressing **Find and send**. See also "Touch Tone Services" on page 40.

Ciphering

Ciphering is a built-in feature that encodes your calls and messages to provide additional privacy. An exclamation mark is shown in the display during a call to indicate that ciphering is currently *not* being provided by the network.

Option Key

By means of the option key, , you can quickly reach the most common options for the function you are currently using. The option key is similar to the right mouse button of your computer.

Menus

There are seven main menus. Each menu has several sub-menus. You enter the menus by briefly pressing or . You also use these keys to move from left to right in the main menus. To move up and down in the sub-menus, use and . Your phone includes pop-up help texts. See "Help Texts" on page 21.

Moving through the Menus

There are two ways of moving through the menus:

- scrolling by using the keys.
- using shortcuts.

Scrolling by Using the Keys

| Press | to |

Tip: When in the menus, instead of pressing the keys repeatedly to reach the sub-menu that you want, you can press and hold the arrow keys or slide and hold the volume key.

Using Shortcuts

A quicker way to move through the menus is to use the shortcuts. First briefly press or to enter the menus, then enter the number of the menu or sub-menu to which you want to go. To get back to standby, press and hold **NO**. See the example on the following page.

Instructions

In the instructions in this User's Guide, we use the arrow keys to describe the functions and settings, since the shortcut numbers may vary between phones according to your subscription and network.

In this example of how to interpret the instructions, we are going to set the key sound to **Tone**.

To set the key sound

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Key sound, YES.
- Select Tone and press YES.

Interpret the instructions as follows:

- From standby mode, use or to scroll to the Settings menu.
- 2. Press **YES** to select the menu.

You are now in the **Settings** menu.

The name of the menu that you have selected is shown at the top of the display.

- 3. Press YES to select the Sounds & alerts sub-menu.
- 4. Use v to scroll to the **Key sound** sub-menu.

Press **YES** to select the sub-menu.

5. Use () to scroll to Tone.

Press YES to select the **Tone** alternative.

You have now set the key sound to Tone.

To go back to standby mode, press and hold the **NO** key.

When using shortcuts, interpret the instructions as follows:

To set the key sound

- 1. From standby mode, press or to enter the menus.
- 2. Press **4** to select the **Settings** menu.
- 3. Press 1 to select the Sounds & alerts sub-menu.
- 4. Press 8 to select the **Key sound** sub-menu.
- 5. Select **Tone** and press **YES**.

Display Text

When you move through the menus, the display changes.

- White text on a grey background at the top indicates the menu you have selected.
- White text on a black background indicates your position in the menus. Press YES to enter this menu or select this setting.
- Grey text indicates a function that is temporarily unavailable, for example due to your subscription or a certain setting which is not on.
- Text marked with a tick indicates the current setting or settings selected.

Your phone includes pop-up help texts that explain the sub-menus.

To turn the help texts on or off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Menu help, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Menu Language

Most modern SIM cards automatically set the menu language to the language of the country where you bought your SIM card,

Automatic. If this is not the case, the pre-set language is English.

To change the menu language

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Language, YES, Menus, YES.
- 2. Select a language and press **YES**.

To select a language that you want to use when writing text, see "Input Languages" on page 30.

Tip: You can always select Automatic by pressing , 8888, in standby, and English by pressing , 0000, in standby.

My Shortcuts

To reach your favourite functions and settings quickly and easily, you can place them in the menu **My shortcuts**. You place them there by selecting them in the list of **Edit shortcuts**.

To select your favourite settings for My shortcuts


- 1. Scroll to My shortcuts, YES, Edit shortcuts, YES.
- Select or clear a setting from the list by scrolling to it and pressing
 **\(\text{\phi}\).



Personalizing Your Phone

Sounds

You can change the volume, ring signal and key sound according to your preferences. You can set a specific ring signal for a specific person so that you know who is calling by the ring signal. You can also compose your own melody and send it to another phone.

Note: If you change a setting which is included in a profile, the profile is also changed. See "Profiles" on page 73.

Ring Volume

You can set the volume to six levels. The first level means that only two clicks are heard when you receive a call. You can also turn the ring signal off (0). An icon then appears when in standby mode.

To set the ring volume

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Ring volume, YES.
- 2. Use \(\rightarrow \) or \(\rightarrow \) to increase or decrease the volume.
- 3. Press YES to save the setting.

Tip: *Use the volume key to change the volume silently.*

Silent

You can set your phone to silent so that all signals, except the alarm and timer signals, are turned off.

To set the phone to silent

- 1. From standby, press (3).
- Select Turn on silent and press YES.
 An icon appears when in standby mode.
 To cancel, repeat step 1 and press YES at Turn off silent.

Increasing Ring

You can select a ring signal, **Increasing ring**, that rises in steps from the lowest volume to the highest.













- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Increasing ring, YES.
- 2. Select **On** or **Off** and press **YES**.

The increasing ring must be **Off** for the ring signal volume to apply.

Ring Signal Type

You can select a ring signal from a list of different sounds and melodies. See also "Composing Your Own Melodies" on page 25.

To select one of the existing ring signals

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Ring signals, YES, Voice calls, YES.
- 2. Select the ring signal type that you want and press YES.

Tip: Use the volume key to change the ring signal silently. The Low Pitch ring signal has been specially developed for people with hearing disabilities.

Specific Ring Signals

If you subscribe to the Two Line Service, you can set different ring signals for the two lines. Line 1 and Line 2 are displayed instead of Voice calls. If your SIM subscription supports Data calls, you can set different ring signals for voice and data calls.

If your subscription includes the Calling Line Identification (CLI) service, you can assign a **Personal ring signal** to up to ten callers.

To set a specific ring signal for a caller

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Ring signals, YES, Personal rings, YES, Add new?, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact name and press YES.
- 3. Select a contact and press YES.
- 4. Select a ring signal and press **YES**.

To delete a caller's number

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Ring signals, YES, Personal rings, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the number you wish to delete and press YES.
- 3. Select **Delete** and press **YES**.

Composing Your Own Melodies

You can compose four different melodies to use as your ring signal.

To compose a melody

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, My melodies, YES.
- Select My melody 1, My melody 2, My melody 3 or My melody 4 and press YES.
- 3. Press © to clear the display.
- **4.** The keypad now works as a keyboard (see figure). Use the keypad to enter notes:
 - Press and hold a key to enter a long note.
 - Press o to raise the note an octave.
 - Press (#) once to raise the note a semitone.
 - Press (#) twice to lower the note a semitone.
 - Press (*4) to enter a pause.
- 5. To listen to your melody, press **YES**.
- 6. Press YES again to save it or press NO to continue composing.

Tip: You can also download existing melodies from the Ericsson Mobile Internet: http://mobileinternet.ericsson.com. See also "Starting the WAP Browser" on page 67.

Exchanging Melodies

You can transfer your melodies to and from another similar phone or download your new melody from a computer or the Ericsson Mobile Internet. You can send and receive melodies using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the infrared port or a text message.

To send a melody

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, My melodies, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the melody that you want to send. Press YES.
- Select Send and press YES.
- 4. Select a transfer method and press YES.
- 5. Continue as described in "Sending and Receiving" on page 52, "Connecting IR Devices" on page 55 or "Sending Messages" on page 44.

When you receive a melody via a text message, you accept the melody by pressing **YES**. To be able to receive a melody using the infrared port or *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the recipient first needs to activate the infrared port or to make the phone discoverable.

To receive a melody

- New melody Play? appears. Press YES if you want to hear the melody before you save it.
- Save melody? appears. Press YES.
- Select the position in the melody list in which you want to save the new melody, press YES.

Vibrating Alert

You can select to be notified of an incoming call by the buzzing of the **Vibrating alert**. You can set the phone's vibrating alert to one of the following:

- On (all the time)
- On if silent (on when the ring volume is turned off or when you have set the phone to silent)
- Off (all the time)

To set the Vibrating Alert

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Vibrating alert, YES.
- 2. Select a setting and press YES.

Note: When your phone is placed in a desktop charger or a car handsfree kit, the vibrating alert is automatically turned off.

Key Sound

You can choose which sound you want the keys to make when you press them. You can choose between clicks, tones or silent.

To set the key sound

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Key sound, YES.
- 2. Select a key sound and press YES.

Display

You can personalize your phone display with a number of settings.

Display Light

You can set the display light to automatic, off or on. In automatic mode, the display light switches off a few seconds after you have pressed the last key.

To set the display light

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Light, YES.
- 2. Select a display light setting and press **YES**.





Sleeping Display

To save battery power, you can turn on the sleeping display. The text in standby mode is reduced to one row at the bottom of the display a few minutes after you have pressed the last key.

To turn the sleeping display on or off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Display sleep, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Contrast Setting

You can change the display's contrast.

To set the display contrast

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Contrast, YES.
- 2. Use or to increase or decrease the contrast.
- 3. Press **YES** to save the setting.

Greeting Text

When you turn on your phone, a text or an image appear as a greeting in the display. You can write your own greeting instead.

To write a new greeting

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, User greeting, YES.
- 2. Select Custom and press YES.
- 3. Write your new greeting.
- 4. Press **YES** to confirm your setting.

To set the standard greeting

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, User greeting, YES.
- Select Standard and press YES.

To turn the greeting off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, User greeting, YES.
- 2. Select **Off** and press **YES**.

Mv Numbers

My numbers shows your phone number(s). If your phone number cannot be retrieved from your SIM card, you can enter it yourself.

To enter your phone number

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Special numbers, YES, My numbers, YES, Voice, YES.
- 2. Enter the number and press **YES**.

Tip: You can also enter your data number and the different numbers for Line 1 and Line 2, if these are supported by your subscription.



Text Size

You can change the size of the letters and thus the number of visible rows in the display.

To change the text size and the number of rows

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Text size, YES.
- 2. Select a text size and press YES.

Time Settings

The time is always shown when the phone is in standby mode.

To set the time

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Time and date, YES, Set time, YES.
- 2. Enter the time in hours and minutes (you can move from number to number by pressing or), and press YES.

 You are now asked whether you want to enter more time information, such as time zone and daylight saving time. Press YES.
- 3. Select a time zone and press **YES**.
- 4. Select a daylight saving time and press YES.

To set the time format

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Time and date, YES, Time settings, YES, Time format, YES.
- 2. Select the 24-hour or 12-hour (am/pm) clock and press **YES**. If you select the 12-hour clock, you can alternate between am and pm by pressing (#).

Automatic Time Zone

Your phone is equipped with an automatic time update function. When your phone changes network, and the time sent out from the operator deviates from the time in your phone, you are asked whether you want to update the time. If you press **YES**, the time is automatically updated.

To turn the Automatic Time Zone on or off

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Time and date, YES, Time settings, YES, Auto time zone, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Date

When the phone is in standby mode, you can slide the volume key up or down to see today's date in the **Status** menu.

To set the date format

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Time and date, YES, Date format, YES.
- 2. Select a date format and press **YES**.

To set the date

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Time and date, YES, Set date, YES.
- Enter the date according to the format you have chosen and then press YES.

Master Reset

You can reset the phone's settings to the way they were when you bought your phone.

To reset the phone

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Master reset, YES, Reset settings, YES.
- Enter the phone lock code (0000) or the number you have changed it to. See "Changing the phone lock code" on page 97.
 Press YES.

Note: The Reset all option deletes all contacts, e-mail messages, text messages and WAP settings.

Entering Letters

You can enter letters, for example, when you add names to the phone book, write text messages or enter WAP addresses.

Apart from the way you normally enter letters in your phone, using multitap text input, you can use **T9 Text Input** for entering text messages and e-mail, for example, if the input language you select supports this. T9 Text Input is a predictive input method and is a quicker way to write texts. See "T9® Text Input" on page 32.

Input Languages

Before you start entering letters, you need to select the input languages that you want to use when writing.

To select input languages

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Language, YES, Input, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the language that you want to use for entering letters and press (**\ddots).
 - Repeat step 2 if you want to use another language.
- **3.** Press **YES** to exit the menu.

When writing, you can switch to one of your selected input languages by pressing ⓐ and then selecting **Input language**. See "The List of Options" on page 33.

Multitap Text Input

When saving names in the phone book or when writing WAP addresses, you enter letters using multitap text input. You press each key as many times as needed to show the letter you want.

In the following example, we are going to write a name:

To enter letters using multitap text input

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Add contact, YES. Press YES again.
- Press the appropriate key, 1 9, 0 or #, repeatedly until the character you want appears in the display.

T9[®] Text Input

You can use T9 Text Input when entering texts such as text messages. The T9 Text Input method uses a built-in dictionary to recognize the most commonly used word for every sequence of key presses. This way, you press each key only once, even if the letter you want is not the first letter on the key.

When you press the keys, different words are suggested. If the word you want is not suggested, you can edit the word (
). The word is then added to the dictionary so that it is suggested the next time.

In the following example, we will start writing a text message:

To enter letters using T9 Text Input

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Write new, YES.
- 2. For example, if you want to write the word "How", press 4,

The word "How" appears.

- 3. If the word shown is the one you want:
 - press 1 to accept and add a space.
 (To accept a word without adding a space, press -.)

If the word shown is not the one you want:

• press o repeatedly to view alternative words (candidates). Accept a word and add a space by pressing 1.

If you do not find the word you want by pressing \circ :

- press (to go to a list of options.
- Select Edit word, YES.
- Delete the entire word by pressing ©, or delete one letter at a time by pressing and then © repeatedly.
- Write the new word using multitap text input and press **YES**. The word is added to the dictionary. The next time you enter 4, 6, 9, the word you just added to the dictionary will appear as one of the alternative words.
- Continue writing your message. See also "Sending Messages" on page 44.

Tip: Press # to enter a full stop. To enter other punctuation marks, press # and then o repeatedly. Accept by pressing 1.

Press and hold (*4) to select an input method.

The List of Options

If you press (when writing, you enter a list of options:

Edit word – for T9 Text Input only
 Edit the suggested word by using multitap text input.

Add symbol

Symbols and punctuation marks such as ? and , are shown. Move between the symbols by using the arrow keys. Press **YES** to select a symbol.

Accept word – for T9 Text Input only
 Accept the suggested word and add a space.

Candidates – for T9 Text Input only
 A list of alternative words is shown. Scroll to a word and press
YES.

Rel. caps lock/Caps lock Switch between capital and lower-case letters.

Input language

A list of the input languages that you selected earlier is shown. If you want to change the input language for the text you are writing, scroll to a language and press **YES**.

Input method

A list of input methods is shown. If you want to change the input method for the text you are writing, scroll to an input method and press **YES**.

Help

Turning off the T9 Text Input

If you wish, you can turn off the T9 Text Input. This setting is valid for all input of texts – not only for the text you are currently entering.

To turn the T9 Text Input on or off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Language, YES, T9 Input, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off.

Phone Book

You can create your personal phone book by saving information about your friends and colleagues as a contact. In a contact, you can save details such as name, title, phone numbers and e-mail address – all in one place.

Saving Contacts

For each contact, you can fill in the following information: first name, last name, company, title, home phone number, work phone number, mobile phone number, other phone number and e-mail address. The contacts are saved in the phone. To save the numbers to the SIM card, see "To copy contacts to the SIM card" on page 37.

To add a new contact

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Add contact, YES.
- Press YES and enter a first name. Press YES and enter a last name, and so on.
 - When you enter phone numbers, you can press (to retrieve a phone number from the phone book, the SIM card or from a list of unsaved numbers.
- When you have filled in the information you want, scroll to Save and exit and press YES.

If voice dialling is on, you are asked if you want to save a voice command for the contact.

Note: Each phone number saved occupies one position in the memory. You can save around 500 positions in the phone. Please contact your network operator to find out how many numbers you can save on the SIM card.

Ask to Save

If you make or receive a call from a number that is not saved in your phone book, you are asked if you want to save the number. If you do not want to be asked, you can turn the Ask to save function off.

To turn the Ask to save function on or off

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Ask to save, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Calling a Contact

To call a phone number saved in a contact, use the **Call contact** function. You can find the contact by searching for either first or last name, depending on which sort order you have set.

To select a sort order

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Sort order, YES.
- 2. Select a sort order and press **YES**.

To call a contact

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Call contact, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact name and press YES.
- 3. If the default phone number of the contact is the number you want to call, press and hold YES.

If you want to call another phone number, press **YES** to go to the contact.

Press of or to go to the phone number you want to call. Press YES to make the call.

Tip: A quicker way to enter the Call contact menu is to press and hold from standby.

Shortcuts to Contacts

When in standby, you can find a contact by:

 pressing and holding one of the keys 2-9 to find a contact beginning with a specific letter.

For example, pressing and holding **2** takes you to the first contact beginning with the letter A (or closest following).

Shortcuts to Phone Numbers

When in standby, you can find a phone number on the SIM card by:

• entering its position number followed by (#).

Once you are in the list of contacts you can use or to scroll through the list, or a letter to go to a certain name.

To see the position of the phone numbers that you have saved, go to $Phone\ book, YES, Options, YES, Position\ list, YES.$

Speed Dialling

You can call the phone numbers that are saved in positions 1–9 on the SIM card.

• From standby, enter the position number and press **YES**.

See also "To change position numbers" on page 37. To copy contacts in your phone to your SIM card, see "To copy contacts to the SIM card" on page 37.

Editing the Phone Book

You can edit a contact in the phone book with the **Edit contact** function.

Tip: When you have selected a contact in your phone book, you can edit the contact by pressing ⓐ and then selecting Edit.

To edit a contact

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Edit contact, YES.
- Enter the first letter of the contact you want to edit. Press YES.
 If the contact shown is not the one you want, press or until you find the correct contact.
- 3. Press YES.

Select **Edit name** or **Edit numbers** and press **YES**.

You can edit the voice command for the contact name by selecting **Edit voice**. You can edit the position for a phone number by selecting **Edit positions**.

- 4. Press \(\textbf{\textit{ or }}\) or \(\textbf{\text{to go to the details that you want to edit.}}\)
- When editing phone numbers, you can press (a) to retrieve a
 phone number from the phone book, the SIM card or from a list of
 unsaved numbers.
- When you have made your changes, press YES. Scroll to Save and exit at the bottom of the list and press YES.

If you scroll to a certain contact in your phone book and then press and hold **YES**, the default phone number of the contact is dialled. You can select another default phone number for a contact, if you wish

To set a default number

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Edit contact, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact you want to edit. Press YES.
- Press YES to select a contact.
- 4. Select **Default number** and press **YES**.
- 5. Select the number you want as the default phone number. Press **YES**.

Edit contact Find: Jj

To delete a contact

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Edit contact, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact you want to delete.
- 3. Press c to delete the contact.
- 4. Press YES to confirm.

To delete all contacts select Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Delete all, YES.

Tip: Your contacts can be synchronized with a program running on a PC or a PDA. See "Synchronization" on page 61.

You can organize your phone book so that the phone numbers you use most frequently are easily available. You can, for example, have certain numbers saved in positions 1-9 to be able to speed dial them.

To change position numbers

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Position list, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the phone number you want to move, press **YES**.
- 3. Scroll to the position to which you want to move the phone number and press yes. The phone numbers switch positions.
- When you have finished, press NO.
 A question appears. Press YES if you want to copy the changes to the SIM card.

Copy to and from the SIM Card

Your contacts are saved in the phone. If you want to speed dial or if you want to use your contacts in another phone, you first need to copy the contacts to the SIM card. The contacts on the SIM card are then replaced by the contacts in the phone.

To copy contacts to the SIM card

Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Copy to SIM, YES.

If you insert a SIM card with saved contacts into your phone, you can call the contacts on the SIM card by selecting **Call from SIM**. To be able to edit the contacts saved on the SIM card, you first have to copy the SIM card contacts to the phone by selecting **Copy from SIM**.

To copy contacts to the phone

Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Copy from SIM, YES.

To call a contact saved on the SIM card

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Call from SIM, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact name and press YES.

Press YES to call the contact.

Tip: When one of the numbers in Call from SIM is highlighted, you can copy the number to the phone by pressing (3) and then selecting Copy to phone.

Business Cards

You can add your own business card as a contact in the phone book. You can then exchange business cards with your colleagues via your phone.

To add or edit your business card

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, My own, YES.
- 2. Select Add my own and press YES.
- 3. Proceed as in "To add a new contact" on page 34.

If you have already entered your own details as a contact, you may want to use this contact as your business card.

To use a contact as your business card

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, My own, YES.
- 2. Select Use contact and press YES.
- Enter the first letter of the contact you want to use as your business card. Press YES.
- 4. If the highlighted contact is not the one you want, scroll through the list until you find the correct contact. Press **YES**.

To delete your business card

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, My own, YES.
- Select Delete my own and press YES.
 The entry is still available in the phone book as an ordinary contact.

Exchanging Business Cards

You can exchange contacts and business cards between your phone and another similar phone, a PDA or a PC using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the infrared port or a text message.

To send your own business card

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, Send my own, YES.
- 2. Select a transfer method and press **YES**.
- Continue as described in "Sending Messages" on page 44, "Sending and Receiving" on page 52 or "Connecting IR Devices" on page 55.

When you receive a business card via a text message, you accept the card by pressing **YES**. To be able to receive a business card using the infrared port or *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the recipient first needs to select the **Receive** menu in order to activate the infrared port or to make the phone discoverable.

To receive a business card

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, Receive, YES.
- 2. Select a transfer method and press **YES**.
- When you receive the business card, press YES to save the card in your phone book.
- 4. Add to phone book? appears. Press YES.
- Reply with own business card appears. Press YES if you want to reply.

To send a contact

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Business cards, YES, Send contact, YES
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact and press YES.
- 3. Select the contact you want to send, YES.
- 4. Select a transfer method and press YES.
- Continue as described in "Sending Messages" on page 44, "Sending and Receiving" on page 52 or "Connecting IR Devices" on page 55.

To send the complete phone book, select **Send phone book**. You can send the complete phone book using the infrared port or *Bluetooth* wireless technology.

Tip: You can send business cards and contacts to specific Bluetooth printers and have them printed out.

Groups

You can create groups of contacts. In this way you can send a text message to several recipients at the same time. See "Sending Messages" on page 44.

To create a new group

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Groups, YES.
- 2. Select Add group and press YES.
- 3. Enter a name for the group and press YES.
- 4. Scroll to Add member, YES.

- 5. Enter the first letter of the contact you want to add. Press YES. If the contact shown is not the one you want, press or until you find the correct contact. Press YES.
- 6. Select a number and press **YES**.
- To add the next member, scroll back to Add member and press YES.

To add a new member to an existing group

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Groups, YES.
- 2. Select the group that you want to edit and press YES.
- 3. Scroll to **Edit**, **YES**, **Add member**, **YES**. Continue the same way as when you add a new member to a new group (see above).

To edit the name of a group

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Groups, YES.
- 2. Select the group name that you want to edit and press YES.
- 3. Select Edit group name and press YES.
- 4. Enter the new name of the group and press **YES**.

To delete a member from a group

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Groups, YES.
- 2. Select the group that you want to edit and press **YES**.
- 3. Select **Edit** and press **YES**.
- **4.** Scroll to the member that you want to delete and press *C*.
- 5. Press **YES** to confirm your choice.

To delete a group

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Groups, YES.
- 2. Select the group that you want to delete and press **YES**.
- 3. Select Delete group and press YES.
- 4. Press **YES** to confirm your choice.

Touch Tone Services

You can save a phone number together with tone signals and codes in your phone book. When you call this entry, the phone number and all the tone signal codes are then dialled automatically. This could be useful, for example, when accessing an answering machine or when using telephone banking services.

Note: Saving personal codes in the phone book involves a risk if your phone is stolen. It is safer to save personal codes in the Code memo. See "Code Memo" on page 101.

To save a phone number together with tone signals and codes

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Add contact, YES.
- Press YES and enter the name that you want to associate with the phone number and code. Press YES.
- 3. Scroll to Other and press YES.
- 4. Enter the phone number. Press and hold ** until the pause character p appears in the display. Enter the code, if needed, enter another pause, another code and so on. Press YES.
- Scroll to Save and Exit and press YES.

Checking the Memory

With the **Memory status** function in your phone book, you can check how many positions you have left in your memory.

To check the status of your phone book memory

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Memory status, YES.
- 2. Use or to scroll through the list.

Text Messages



You can send and receive text messages with the Short Message Service (SMS) using your mobile phone.

Before Sending Messages

Before you send a text message for the first time, make sure you have made the settings below.

Service Centre

If you want to send or reply to a text message, your network operator's service centre number must be set. Most SIM cards already contain the service centre number. In some cases you may have to activate it. You must obtain the number from your network operator.

To activate a service centre number on the SIM card

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Service centres, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the number you want and press YES.
- 3. Select **Activate** and press **YES**.

If no number is found in the list, you have to enter the number yourself.

To enter the phone number of your service centre

- Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Service centres, YES, Add new?, YES.
- Enter the number, including the international sign (+) and country code and press YES.

To send a text message as an e-mail message, you first need to enter your e-mail gateway number. For details, please contact your network operator. See also "Message Options" on page 43.

To enter an e-mail gateway number

- Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, E-mail gateways, YES, Add new?, YES.
- 2. Enter the e-mail gateway number and press **YES**.

Using GPRS



You can send a text message using GPRS as the access type. For more details, please check with your network operator.

To select GPRS as the access type

- 1. Make sure you have created a **data account** and selected **Automatic** as the preferred service. See "Data Account Settings" on page 62 and "GPRS and GSM Data Settings" on page 64.
- 2. Scroll to Settings, YES, Data comm., YES, SMS access, YES.
- 3. Select GPRS preferred and press YES.

Message Options

You can create the settings below as default for all your messages, or you can turn on the option **Set on send**, which means that you choose the settings each time you send a message.

Message type

You can select how you want your text message to be interpreted by the recipient, for example, as a text message, or as a fax or email message.

Validity period

If your message cannot be delivered because the recipient has turned off the phone, your service centre can save the message to send it later, within a certain time period.

Reply request

If you want the recipient of your message to reply, you can turn on the **Reply request** option. You are usually charged for the reply. Please contact your network operator for details. When you send a message, you are asked whether you want the recipient to reply or not.

Status request

With this option on, you can view the status of a sent message. For more information, see "Status Report" on page 45.

To set a default value for the options above

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES.
- 2. Select the option you want and press YES.
- 3. Select **Set default** and press **YES**.
- 4. Select your default value from the list and press YES.

To turn Set on send on or off

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES.
- 2. Select the option you want and press **YES**.
- 3. Select Set on send and press YES.
- 4. Select On or Off and press YES.



Sending Messages

You use the keypad to enter the message you want to send. For information on how to enter text, see "Entering Letters" on page 30. You can send your message to one person or to a pre-defined group, specified and saved in the phone book. For more information on how to create groups, see "Groups" on page 39. When you send text messages to a group, you are charged for each member included in the group.

To send a message

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Write new, YES.
- 2. Enter your message and press YES.
- 3. Enter the recipient's number or press to retrieve the number from the phone book or the call list.
- Press YES to send the message.
 Sending msg appears in the display followed by Message has been sent.

Saving the Message for Later Use

 Press NO after you have entered your message. The message is saved in the Unsent menu.

To send a message later

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Unsent, YES.
- 2. Select the message you want to send and press YES.
- 3. Press YES again.
- Select Send and press YES.You may now edit your message.
- **5.** Press **YES** and send the message as described above.

Long messages

A short text message can contain up to 160 characters. You can send a longer message, but it is automatically divided into several shorter messages (up to six messages) and you are charged for each message.

To turn long messages on or off

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Long message, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

To send a long message

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Write new, YES.
- Enter your message and press YES.
 The display shows how many parts the message is divided into,
 SMS 2. SMS 3 and so on.
- 3. Enter the recipient's number or press to retrieve the number from the phone book or the call list.
- **4.** Press **YES** to send the message.

Note: If the recipient's phone does not support long messages, the messages are received one at a time.

Templates

If you have one or more standard messages that you often use, you can save these as templates in your phone. You can save up to ten templates consisting of up to 30 characters each.

To create a template

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Templates, YES, Add new?, YES.
- **2.** Enter the message and press **YES**.
- 3. To send the message now, press YES when Send message now? appears in the display, and proceed as described in "Sending Messages" on page 44. The message is saved in the list of templates.
- If you do not want to send the message now, press NO.
 The message is saved as a template for later use.

If you want to use a template as a message, scroll to **Messages**, **YES**, **Templates**, **YES**, select the template you want from the list and then select **Write new**.

To delete a template, scroll to **Messages**, **YES**, **Templates**, **YES**. Select the template you want to delete and press (c), **YES**.

Status Report

You can request a status report for a sent text message, providing your network supports the status report service. In the status report you can see if the message has been delivered or not.

To request a status report for a sent message

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Sent items, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the message you want a status report for and press YES.
- 3. Press YES again.
- 4. Select Status request and press YES.



To check the status of a sent message

Scroll to Messages, YES, Sent items, YES, View status, YES.

Receiving Messages

When you receive a message, the phone beeps (see "Message Signal" on page 48), the indicator light on the top of the phone rapidly flashes green and the message **New message Read now?** appears in the display.

To read the message at once

- Press YES when you see the question New message Read now?.
 If you have received several messages, and you press YES at the question above, you enter the Inbox. Select the message that you want to read and press YES.
- 2. Scroll through the message by using the and keys. An arrow in the bottom right-hand corner of the display indicates that there is more text in the message. All parts of a long message may not be received at the same time. ... indicates that part of the message has yet to be received.

Note: If the sender of the message wants you to reply, the display shows 'Reply requested Reply?' when you press **YES** at the end of the message. Press **YES** again to reply. If you do not want to reply, press **NO**.

To read a message later

- Press NO when you see the question New message Read now?.
 The message is saved in the phone and an envelope icon appears at the top of the display. If you want to read the message, you can retrieve it from the lnbox menu.
 - means an unread message.
 - means that the message is saved on the SIM card.

List of Options

If you select a message in the **Inbox** by pressing **YES** and then press , you can see a list of options: **Delete**, **Reply**, **Forward**, **Save**, **Call**, **Mail to**, **Save** [number], **Send to printer**, **Read next**.

Tip: You can also reach a list of options in the Unsent or Sent items menus, by pressing **(3)** after selecting a message.

To delete a message

- There are two ways to delete a message:
 - Select **Delete** in the list of options and press **YES**.
 - In the **Inbox** menu, scroll to a message and press *C*, **YES**.





To reply to a message

- 1. Select **Reply** in the list of options and press **YES**.
- 2. Select the way you want to reply to the message:
 - enter a new message
 - · include the message you want to reply to and enter a reply
 - use a template and enter a reply

and press YES.

3. Enter your reply and press **YES** to send the message.

To forward a message

- 1. Select Forward in the list of options, press YES.
- 2. You can now edit the message. Press YES.
- Enter the recipient's phone number, or press to retrieve the number from the phone book or the call list. Press YES to send.

To save a received message

Select Save in the list of options and press YES.
 The message is saved on the SIM card. Messages that are saved on the SIM card remain there until you delete them.

To call the sender of a message

Select Call in the list of options and press YES.

Tip: To call a phone number found in a message, press **YES** when the number is **highlighted** and then press **YES** again.

To save a phone number found in a message

- 1. When the number is highlighted, press **YES**.
- Select Save [number] and press YES. You can find the number in a list of unsaved numbers. To add the number to the phone book, see "To add a new contact" on page 34.

To send a message to an e-mail address found in a message

- 1. Make sure you have set the e-mail gateway number, see "To enter an e-mail gateway number" on page 42.
- 2. Select Mail to in the list of options and press YES.
- 3. Enter a message and press YES.
- 4. Press **YES** again to send the message.

You can send a message to an Ericsson-approved *Bluetooth* printer and have the message printed out.

To send a message to a printer

- 1. Select **Send to printer** in the list of options, press **YES**.
- 2. Select Via Bluetooth, YES.
- 3. Select the relevant printer in the list of devices, **YES**.

Message Signal

You can choose the signal you want to hear when you receive a message. You can choose between clicks, tones or silent.

To set the message signal

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Message alert, YES.
- 2. Select a signal and press YES.

Area Information

The ordinary Short Message Service is a personal service that carries your private messages. Area Information is another type of text message, for example a local traffic report or the phone number of a local taxi company, that is sent to all subscribers in a certain network area. Please contact your network operator for further details.

To turn area information on or off

- Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Area info, YES, Reception, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Area Information Message List

You can decide which types of area information messages you wish to receive. The number of area information codes that can be saved depends on your SIM card.

To enter an area information code

- Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Area info, YES, Edit list, YES, Add new?, YES.
- 2. Enter the new code and press YES.

To delete an area information code

• If you want to delete a code, scroll to the code and press ©.

Cell Information

The cell information channel is used by some network operators for sending messages to their subscribers within a certain network area.

To turn cell information on or off

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Cell information, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.











Bluetooth™ Wireless Technology

Your phone has built-in *Bluetooth* wireless technology. Short-range radio links operate in a globally available frequency band and make it possible for you to connect your phone wirelessly to different *Bluetooth* devices such as a headset, PC, PDA or printer. You can have a conversation via a cordless *Bluetooth* headset or browse the Internet on a PC wherever you are, wirelessly connected via a mobile phone. You can exchange information such as your business card, contacts, calendar appointments and tasks, ring melodies and game commands. You can automatically synchronize information in your phone and your PC. You may connect to several *Bluetooth* devices, but only one at a time.

Note: For best performance, we recommend that your phone and the **Bluetooth** device you are communicating with are within a range of 10 metres. In some situations, avoiding solid objects in between your phone and the other Bluetooth device may improve the connection.

Before You Start

Before you start communicating with a *Bluetooth* device, an accessory such as a cordless *Bluetooth* headset or a PC, you need to:

- pair your phone with the device you do this by adding the device to a list of paired devices in your phone.
- set your computer for Bluetooth communication for communication between your phone and a PC.

Note: To browse the Internet via Bluetooth wireless technology on a PC, you need to install the Bluetooth installation software which you can find on the Ericsson CD that comes with your mobile phone.

To exchange melodies, business cards, calendar entries or game commands using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, you do *not* need to pair your phone with the other device. You only need to make sure that the devices are within range of each other, and that the operation mode is set to Automatic or On. See "Operation Modes" on page 51.



Pairing

Pairing is the process of associating *Bluetooth* devices with each other so that they connect as soon as they get within range of each other. Your phone can be paired with up to ten *Bluetooth* devices. You can initiate the pairing between two *Bluetooth* devices from your own phone or you can accept a request for pairing from the other device. After having paired your phone with the other Bluetooth device, the operation mode is automatically set to On. See "Operation Modes" on page 51.

To initiate pairing with a device

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Paired devices, YES, Add device?, YES. Phone initiates. YES.
- A list of device types that can be paired with your phone is shown. Scroll to a device type and press YES. If you are not sure about what type of device you want to pair with your phone, you can choose All.
- 3. The phone starts to search for *Bluetooth* devices. When the search is finished, the display shows available devices of the type you selected. Select the device that you want to pair with your phone by pressing **YES**.
- **4.** Enter a passkey (up to 16 digits) for both your phone and for the other device. (If a passkey does not come with the *Bluetooth* device when you buy it, you need to create one yourself.)
- 5. When the pairing has been completed, you may edit the name tag for the device and press **YES**.

Tip: Grey icons are Bluetooth devices that have not yet been paired with your phone. See "Icons" on page 131 for information about icons that may appear in the phone display.

To accept pairing with a device

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Paired devices, YES, Add device?, YES, Phone accepts, YES.
 - The phone waits for the other device. This may take a while.
- 2. A question appears. Press **YES** to confirm the pairing.
- 3. Enter an identical passkey on the phone and on the other device.
- 4. When the pairing has been completed, you may edit the name tag for the device and press **YES**.

You can edit the list of paired devices, for example by editing the name tag of a device, deleting a device from the list or by editing the order of the devices in the list.

To edit the name tag of a device

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Paired devices, YES.
- A list of paired devices is shown. Scroll to the device you want to edit and press YES.
- 3. Scroll to **Edit** and press **YES**.
- 4. Edit the name tag and press **YES**.

To delete a device from the list

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Paired devices, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the device and press c. Delete? appears. Press YES.

To edit the order of the devices in the list

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Paired devices, YES.
- Scroll to the device whose position you want to change and press YES.
- 3. Enter the position number (2 10) you want for the device. (Position 1 is always for the headset.)

Phone Name

You can choose a name for your phone. This name is shown in other devices when your phone is discovered.

To enter a name for your phone

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Phone name, YES, Edit, YES.
- Enter a name and press YES.The name is also used for the infrared port.

Operation Modes

There are four different operation modes, depending on what you want the phone to do:

- Off the phone cannot send or receive any information.
- Automatic The Bluetooth function is activated automatically when you start sending information such as a business card or when you answer an incoming call by pressing the Bluetooth headset button.
- On the Bluetooth function is activated all the time (until you change the mode). The phone can send and receive information to and from a paired *Bluetooth* device.
- **Discoverable** the phone can receive information from any *Bluetooth* device and can accept pairing.

Note: In countries where the use of **Bluetooth** wireless technology is not allowed, you must ensure that the **Bluetooth** function is set to Off.









Discover Phone HeadSet PC PDA

To change the operation mode

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Operation mode, YES.
- 2. Select Off, Automatic or On and press YES.

In order to be detected by *Bluetooth* devices searching for other *Bluetooth* devices in the vicinity, you must make your phone **discoverable**.

To make the phone discoverable

Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Discoverable, YES.
 Your phone is discoverable for a few minutes. It then returns to the operation mode that it was in before.

Searching for Devices

You can choose first to search for *Bluetooth* devices and then, for example, to pair the device with your phone, or to exchange business cards.

To discover devices

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Bluetooth, YES, Discover devices, YES.
 A list of discovered devices appears.
- 2. You can now choose to add the device to the list of paired devices as long as the list is not full.

Note: The devices are not shown in the list of devices unless they are discoverable.

Sending and Receiving

To send an item such as a business card, a calendar appointment or a melody using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, you need to make sure that the devices are within range of each other.

The procedure of sending items via *Bluetooth* wireless technology differs depending on the item you want to send. See "Exchanging Melodies" on page 25, "Exchanging Business Cards" on page 38 and "Exchanging Calendar Entries" on page 59.

To send an item

 After you select Bluetooth as the transfer method, the phone searches for devices. A list of devices appears. Select the device you want to send the item to and press YES. There are certain items in your phone that you can send to specific *Bluetooth* printers and have printed out. This can be useful if, for example, you want to print an overview of all the meetings that you have scheduled in your phone. Select the relevant printer in the list of devices.

These are items you can send to printers using *Bluetooth* wireless technology:

- · Monthly, weekly and daily overviews
- Appointments and tasks
- Contacts
- Business cards
- Text messages

To receive an item

- To be able to receive an item, do one of the following:
 - scroll to the Receive menu and press YES.
 For example, to receive a calendar appointment, scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Receive, YES.
 - set the phone to **Discoverable** mode.

Infrared Port

Your phone is equipped with a port using infrared (IR) as a communications link. With IR you can connect your phone to another similar phone, a PDA or a PC. You can send and receive, for example, calendar appointments and tasks, business cards, melodies and game commands.

Before you start communicating with another IR device, you need to ensure that:

- the IR port is on.
- the IR devices are placed so that the IR ports are facing each other.
- the software for infrared communication is installed.
 You can find the software installation on the enclosed CD.

Note: To be able to use the browsing services, you have to have PC programs for the respective services.

Activating the IR Port

The IR port has three settings:

- On. The phone keeps searching for other IR devices until the port is turned off. When the IR port is set to on, an icon appears in the display.
- Off. The port is not active.
- 10 minutes. The port is automatically turned off 10 minutes after the last data transmission.

To set the IR port


- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Infrared port, YES.
- 2. Select On, Off or 10 minutes and press YES.





Connecting IR Devices

Place your phone and the other device so that the IR ports are facing each other. Make sure that the IR function is activated on both devices.



You can move the devices out of line for a short while (approximately 15-20 seconds) without interrupting the connection.

Strong sunlight can interfere with infrared light.

Phone Name

You can choose a name for your phone. This name is shown in other devices when they are connected to your phone.

To enter a name for your phone

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Phone Name, YES, Edit, YES.
- Enter a name and press YES.The name is also used for *Bluetooth* wireless technology.

Calendar

You can use the calendar to keep track of important meetings that you need to attend, phone calls that you need to make or tasks that you need to do.

Appointments and Tasks

You can save up to 200 appointments and tasks in your calendar, depending on the size of each item. You can choose to add a new appointment or task, or use an old appointment or task as a template by copying and editing it.

- Appointments: meetings, vacation, phone call, etc.
- Tasks: make a phone call, send a message, pay bills etc.

You can fill in different types of information about the appointments or tasks.

To add a new appointment

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Add appointm., YES.
- 2. Select the type of appointment and press **YES**.
- Press YES and enter a subject.
 If the appointment is a meeting, you can press (a) to retrieve a contact from the phone book.
- 4. Scroll to Location, press YES, enter a location, and so on.
- 5. Scroll to Continue? and press YES.
- 6. Press YES and enter a start date or press (a) and select a date.

 Scroll to Time, press YES, enter a start time, and so on.
- 7. Scroll to Continue? and press YES.
- Select the reminder interval you want, for example 5 min before, and press YES.

If you select **Oth. reminder**, enter a reminder date and press **YES**. Enter a reminder time and press **YES**.

9. A list of options appears.

If the appointment is recurrent:

- Select **Recurrent app.** and press **YES**.
- Select the recurrence you want and press **YES**.











If you want to set an end date, select **Set end date** and press YES. Enter a date and press YES.

If you want to change the class for your appointment:

- Select Class and press YES.
- Select the class you want and press **YES**.

If you want to set the time zone for a meeting:

- Select **Time zone** and press **YES**.
- Select a time zone and press **YES**. Your meeting time will be adjusted automatically according to the time zone you are in.
- 10. Confirm with Save and close, YES

To add a new task

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Add task, YES.
- Select a task and press YES. If you select phone call, enter a number and press YES. If you select message, select a type of message and press **YES**. If you select miscellaneous, select a type and press YES.
- 3. Press YES and enter a subject. Scroll to Descr., press YES and enter a description.
- 4. Scroll to Continue? and press YES.
- 5. If you want to set a reminder, scroll to **Set reminder** and press **YES**. Enter a reminder date and press **YES**.
- 6. A list of options appears. Confirm with Save and close, YES.

Viewing Your Calendar

To view your calendar content, scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES and then select one of the following:

- **View today.** This shows see all the appointments for the current day and the tasks that have not been completed. An icon appears next to those appointments that cover the whole day. To see options for your appointments or tasks, press (3).
- View all tasks. This shows all your entered tasks. Scroll to the task you want to view and press YES.
 - To see options for your tasks, press (3).
- View month. This shows a whole month, with the current day in a square. Move within and among the weeks by using the arrow keys. Press YES to enter a certain day. Days on which you have appointments are marked in bold. When in month view, you can press (a) to select another year, month or week.
- View week. This shows a whole week. All your appointments and tasks are shown as grey boxes. You enter a certain day by pressing









YES when that day is highlighted. When in week view, you can press (a) to select another week.

Editing and Deleting

You may wish to edit an appointment or a task, for example, by changing the date or location.

To edit or delete an appointment

- 1. In the calendar, scroll to the day of the appointment you want to edit and press YES.
 - If you want to delete the appointment, press **C**. **Delete?** appears, press **YES**.
- 2. To edit, press .
- 3. Select **Edit** and press **YES**.
- 4. Proceed as described in "To add a new appointment" on page 56.
- 5. When you have finished, scroll to Save and close and press YES.

To edit or delete a task

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, View all tasks, YES.
- 3. To edit, press .
- 4. Select **Edit** and press **YES**.
- 5. Proceed as described in "To add a new task" on page 57.
- 6. When you have finished, scroll to Save and close and press YES.

The List of Options

When you have selected an appointment or a task in one of the calendar views, you can press (a) to view a list of options. You may now choose one of the following options:

- Edit. Enter the correct date, time and so on and press YES after each entry. When you have finished editing the appointment or task, scroll to Save and close and press YES.
- **Delete**. Press **YES** to delete an appointment or a task.
- Send. See "Exchanging Calendar Entries" on page 59.
- **Reschedule**. You can re-schedule an appointment. Select a week in the monthly view and press **YES**. Select a day in the weekly view and press **YES** to re-schedule the appointment to the selected day. Edit and press **YES**.
- Copy. You can use an old appointment or task as a template by copying and editing it. Enter a category, description and so on, and

confirm each entry by pressing YES.

 Call. Select a task or an appointment that contains a phone number in the subject, and press YES to make the phone call.

Calendar Settings

To view your calendar options, scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Options, YES, and then select one of the following:

- **Status**. Use this to check when you last synchronized your calendar, how much space is left for new appointments and tasks.
- Class view. You can choose whether to see only the private calendar entries, only the public ones or both.
- **Reminders**. Turn on this function if you want your phone to remind you even though the phone is turned off.
- Profile switch. If you set the profile switch reminder function to
 On, the question Switch profile? appears when a meeting is about
 to start. Press YES to view the list of profiles and select a profile.
 After the meeting, you are asked to switch profile again.
- **Delete all**. Deletes all appointments and tasks in the calendar.

Exchanging Calendar Entries

You can send and receive appointments and tasks using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the infrared port or a text message.

To send an appointment or a task

- 1. Select **Send** in the list of options.
- 2. Select a transfer method.

Continue as described in "Connecting IR Devices" on page 55, "Sending Messages" on page 44 or "Sending and Receiving" on page 52.

You can send appointments and tasks to specific *Bluetooth* printers and have them printed out. Select the relevant printer in the list of devices.

You can also send daily, weekly and monthly overviews to specific *Bluetooth* printers and have the overviews printed out.

To send calendar views to a printer

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Send, YES.
- Select a view: View today, View week or View month and press YES.
- Scroll to the day, week or month you want to print and press YES.
- Scroll to Send, YES, Via Bluetooth, YES.



5. Select the printer in the list of devices and press YES.

When you receive an appointment or a task via a text message, you accept it by pressing **YES**. To be able to receive calendar items using the infrared port or *Bluetooth* wireless technology, you first need to select the **Receive** menu in order to activate the infrared port or to make the phone discoverable.

To receive an appointment or a task

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Calendar, YES, Receive, YES.
- 2. Select a transfer method and press **YES**.
- When you receive a calendar item, press YES to save it in the calendar.

If your calendar is full, you must remove calendar items before saving any new ones.

Synchronization

You can synchronize the calendar and contacts in your phone with the calendar and contacts in your PC. To do this, you first need to install a synchronization program on your PC. You can find such a program on the Ericsson CD that comes with your mobile phone.

Starting the Synchronization

You can synchronize using *Bluetooth* wireless technology, the infrared port or a cable. If you want to use the *Bluetooth* wireless technology, you must first pair your mobile phone with the other device. See "To initiate pairing with a device" on page 50.

To start the synchronization

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Synchronization, YES, Synchronize, YES.
- Select the synchronization method you wish to use and press YES.
 - If you select **Use Bluetooth**: Select a device in the list, for example a PC (paired with your phone and with the synchronization program installed).
 - If you select Use IR:
 Make sure the infrared port of the phone and the other device
 are facing each other.

Synchronization Sound

You can select whether you want the phone to make a sound when the synchronization is finished.

To turn the synchronization sound on or off

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Synchronization, YES, Sound, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.



Setting up WAP

In order to browse via WAP, you must enter settings for a **data account** in your phone. The settings specify all the information your phone needs to communicate with a certain server on the Internet, for example, the address of that server. You can have several data accounts saved in your phone, with different settings for different purposes. For fast and efficient access, try the General Packet Radio Service (**GPRS**) as the access type.

In order to browse via WAP, you also need to enter settings for a **WAP profile** and select which WAP profile you want to use when browsing.

Note: The settings may already be entered when you buy the phone, or you can receive the settings from your network operator or your Internet service provider. You can also receive settings from http://mobileinternet.ericsson.com.

Data Account Settings

The main setting for a data account is the **access type** (connection method). You can choose between two access types:

- GPRS (General Packet Radio Service) data
 GPRS allows you to be always online, yet pay only for the amount
 of data transmitted and not for the time you are connected. Please
 contact your network operator for charging details.
- GSM data
 Normally, you pay for the time you are connected.

To create a data account

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Data comm., YES, Data accounts, YES, Add account?, YES.
- 2. Enter a name for the data account.
- 3. Select an access type: GPRS data or GSM data.
- 4. Enter the settings that you have received from your operator.

 For GPRS: access point name, user id and password.

 For GSM data: phone number, user id and password.
 - Confirm each setting by pressing **YES**.
- 5. Scroll to Save?, press YES.



To enter additional settings for a data account

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Data comm., YES, Data accounts, YES.
- 2. Select a data account and press **YES**.
- Select Edit.
- Select the setting you want to edit and press YES. Edit the setting, press YES.
- 5. Repeat step 4 for all the settings you want to edit.

Settings for GPRS:

APN address (Access point name address) – the address of the external data network you want to connect to, either an IP address or a text string.

User id – your user id to log on to the external data network.

Password – your password to log on to the external data network.

Passwd. request (Password request) – if this setting is on, you are asked for a password each time you log on to the external data network.

Pref. service (Preferred service) – if you want to be able to accept incoming calls during a GPRS session, select **Automatic**. If not, select **GPRS only**, ★.

IP address – the IP address that the phone uses when communicating with the network. If you do not enter a value, the network provides you with a temporary IP address.

Advan. settings (Advanced settings) – these are optional. Consult your network operator.

Settings for GSM data:

Phone number – the phone number of your Internet service provider.

User id, Password, Passwd. request. Same as for GPRS above.

Data rate – select the speed you want for the connection.

Dial type – select analogue or ISDN connection.

If you want to change access type, you have to create a new data account and select the access type you want to use.



GPRS and GSM Data Settings

If you have selected GPRS as the access type, the Preferred mode should be set to **Automatic**. An icon may then appear in the display telling you that GPRS is within range. See "Icons" on page 131. If you have selected GSM data as the access type, you should select **GSM only** as the preferred mode. This setting is valid for all data accounts

To select a preferred mode

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Data comm., YES, Pref. mode, YES.
- 2. Select Automatic or GSM only.

Tip: To see the status of GPRS coverage and connection, slide the volume key up or down from standby to enter the Status menu and then scroll to GPRS.

WAP Profile Settings

When you browse WAP pages, you use a certain **WAP profile**. A WAP profile is a collection of settings that determines, for example, how you connect to the mobile Internet. You could, for example, have one WAP profile for mobile e-commerce and another one for general WAP browsing. You can have five WAP profiles. By switching WAP profile, you also switch settings in a simple way.

There are three ways in which WAP profile settings can be entered into your phone:

- The settings are already entered when you buy the phone.
- You receive the settings in a text message (over the air), for example, from http://mobileinternet.ericsson.com.
- You enter the settings manually.

Note: You may not need to enter all the settings below. Contact your network operator or service provider (a distributor of WAP pages) before you start changing the settings yourself.

To enter WAP profile settings manually

- Make sure you have created a data account between your phone and the WAP gateway.
- 2. Scroll to WAP services, YES, WAP settings, YES.
- 3. Select the profile that you want to edit and press **YES**.
- 4. Scroll to **Rename**, **YES**. Enter a name for the profile.
- 5. Scroll to **Chg homepage**, **YES**. Enter the address of the WAP page you want to have as homepage.



- Scroll to Save to, YES. Select if the bookmarks that you add during browsing should be available for all your WAP profiles or only for the WAP profile you are currently using.
- 7. Scroll to Gateway, YES.
- 8. For GPRS and GSM data, select **IP settings**, **YES**. Continue as described in "To enter IP settings" below.

For SMS, scroll to **Change type**, **YES**, **SMS**, **YES**. Then select **SMS settings**, **YES**. Continue as described in "To enter SMS settings" below.

To enter IP settings

- Select Connect using, YES. Select the data account you want to use when browsing.
- Scroll to IP address, YES. Enter the IP address of the WAP gateway.
- 3. Scroll to **User id**, **YES**. Enter your user id for the WAP gateway.
- Scroll to Password, YES. Enter your password for the WAP gateway.
- 5. Scroll to Data mode, YES. Select a data connection mode, YES.
- Scroll to Security, YES. Select On if you want a secure connection, or Off if you do not want a secure connection.
- Scroll to Show images, YES. Select On if you want to view images while browsing, or Off if you do not want to view images while browsing.
- Scroll to Response timer, YES. Enter a time limit in seconds after which a download attempt will stop.

To enter SMS settings

- 1. Select **Service centre**, **YES**. Enter the phone number of your network operator's service centre.
- 2. Scroll to **SMS gateway**, **YES**. Enter the phone number of your network operator's SMS gateway.
- 3. Scroll to **User id**, **YES**. Enter your user id for the WAP gateway.
- Scroll to Password, YES. Enter your password for the WAP gateway.
- 5. Scroll to **Security**, **YES**. Select **On** if you want a secure connection, or **Off** if you do not want a secure connection.
- 6. Scroll to Show images, YES. Select On if you want to view images while browsing, or Off if you do not want to view images while browsing.

Scroll to Response timer, YES. Enter a time limit in seconds after which a download attempt will stop.

Note: An IP address consists of four groups of digits, with a maximum of three in each group, for example 136.225.37.163. If any of the digit groups consists of only one or two digits, enter a leading zero (0) for each digit that is missing, 136.225.037.163.

Before you start using the WAP browser, you must select which of your WAP profiles you want to use when browsing.

To select a WAP profile

- 1. Scroll to WAP services, YES, Select profile, YES.
- 2. Select a WAP profile and press YES.



WAP

WAP (Wireless Application Protocol) is a global standard for advanced mobile services, for example, mobile Internet communication, mobile e-commerce and telephony services. WAP allows you to access certain services on the Internet such as banking services, news and reservation services from your mobile phone.

Note: In order to access WAP services, you need a subscription that supports data transmission and WAP browsing.

Before you start using the WAP browser, make sure you have created a data account, entered the WAP profile settings and selected a WAP profile. See "Setting up WAP" on page 62. For fast and efficient browsing, try the General Packet Radio Service (**GPRS**) as the access type.

Starting the WAP Browser

To start browsing

- 1. Scroll to WAP services and press YES.
- 2. Select one of the following ways to start browsing:
 - Open your homepage. Ericsson Mobile Internet is the homepage which is set when you buy your phone.
 - Go to one of your bookmarks. Scroll to Bookmarks, YES.
 Select a bookmark from the list and press YES.
 - Enter the address of a WAP page. Scroll to Enter address,
 YES. Enter the WAP address, for example:
 mobileinternet.ericsson.com. (You only need to enter a prefix if you want to use a protocol other than http, such as ftp://.)

Exiting the WAP Browser

To exit the browser

Press and hold NO. Remain connected? appears. Press NO.
 If you want to leave the browser temporarily but stay on-line, press (3) and select Go to menu.

Options When Browsing

When browsing, you can reach different browsing options such as links or special features by pressing . The options may vary depending on the WAP page you are visiting.

The following options are always found:

- **Homepage** go to the homepage of the current WAP profile.
- Bookmarks add the page you are currently browsing to your list
 of bookmarks, or view the list of bookmarks for the WAP profile
 you are currently using.
 - Bookmarks which have been saved in a WAP profile other than the one you are currently using are in grey. To view all bookmarks, exit the browser and go to WAP services, YES, Bookmarks, YES.
- Enter address enter the WAP address of a page you want to visit.
- Send as link send a text message with a link to the current WAP page to another phone.
- Reload refresh the contents of the WAP page.
- Go to menu go back to the WAP services menu in order to
 access other phone menus. The connection to the Internet is not
 interrupted. When you want to start browsing again, scroll to
 WAP services, YES, Resume, YES.
- Exit close down the WAP connection.
- Status display the current status, for example how long you have been browsing.
- New homepg set the current WAP page as the homepage for the WAP profile you are currently using.

Additional WAP Options

When not browsing, you can, for example, change the homepage, edit your bookmarks or clear the cache memory.

Changing the Homepage of a WAP Profile

When you buy your mobile phone, Ericsson Mobile Internet is set to be the homepage in each of the five WAP profiles that you have in your phone.

To change the homepage of a WAP profile

- 1. Scroll to WAP services, YES, WAP settings, YES.
- 2. Select the profile whose homepage you want to change, YES.
- 3. Scroll to Chg homepage, YES.

- 4. Enter the name of the homepage, YES.
- 5. Enter the address of the homepage, **YES**.

Your List of Bookmarks

When you are not browsing, you can see all your WAP bookmarks in **Bookmarks**. You can have a maximum of 50 bookmarks.

To work with your bookmarks when not browsing

- 1. Scroll to WAP services, YES, Bookmarks, YES.
- 2. Select the bookmark you want to go to, edit or send, YES.
- 3. Select one of the following submenus and press YES:
 - Go to bookmark. Go to the marked WAP page.
 - Edit bookmark. Edit the name and/or the WAP address of the bookmark.
 - Delete Delete the bookmark
 - Send as link. This creates a text message in which the WAP address is sent as a link. You can add a comment if you wish.

Clearing Cache

You can clear the cache memory which contains previously visited WAP pages.

To clear the cache memory

- 1. Scroll to WAP services, YES, Clear cache, YES.
- 2. Clear cache? appears. Press YES.

Security

When you use certain WAP services, for example mobile ecommerce, you need a secure connection between your phone and the WAP gateway. If you are connected securely while browsing, an icon appears in the display.

To establish secure connections, you need to have **certificates** saved in your phone. A **trusted certificate** guarantees that a WAP site is genuine. If you have this type of certificate saved in your phone, it means you trust all WAP gateways that its supplier, for example a network operator, has certified.

You can find and download certificates from certain WAP pages. Ask your network operator or service provider for the WAP address. Certificates may already be saved in your phone when you buy it.

To download a certificate

- 1. Browse to the WAP page where the certificates are.
- Click a suitable link and follow the instructions to download the certificate to your phone.

To check the certificates in your phone

 Scroll to WAP services, YES, WAP settings, YES, Common, YES, Trusted certif, YES.

A list of the available certificates is shown.

WAP Push Messages

A service provider can send, for example, updated news or new WAP settings to your phone in a **push message**.

There are two kinds of push messages:

- Text messages that inform you about a WAP page.
- WAP pages with the updated information appear, and the WAP browser starts automatically.

Note: When receiving push messages as WAP pages, you are charged for the data connection initiated by the WAP browser until you press **NO** to close down the WAP connection.

Accepting or Rejecting Push Messages

If you do not want to receive push messages, you can turn off the **Push access**. This setting is valid for all your WAP profiles.

To turn the push access on or off

- Scroll to WAP services, YES, WAP settings, YES, Common, YES, Push access, YES.
- Select On or Off.

Receiving Push Messages

When you receive a push message, it comes to the **Push inbox**.

When you have read the message, press **YES** and select one of the following:

- Postpone. Saves the push message so that you can load and see it later.
- Load. The browser starts and loads the pushed WAP page.
- Delete. Deletes the push message.



Data Calls

A data call is a call where information, for example, e-mail messages, is sent between computers or servers via the built-in modern in your phone. To be able to send and receive data calls, you need:

- the appropriate computer program, such as an e-mail program.
- a phone subscription that supports data transmission.

For detailed information, please consult your network operator. WAP browsing is a data call sent between your phone and a mobile Internet server, not involving any computer program. See "WAP" on page 67.

Sending Data Calls

Data calls are initiated from the appropriate computer program. To send data calls you need to connect your phone to a computer via *Bluetooth* wireless technology, an infrared port or a cable and then start the computer program.

Receiving Data Calls

If you have separate numbers for voice and data calls, your phone recognizes the type of call.

Receiving Data Calls – Separate Numbers

If your network and subscription support separate numbers for the different types of call, the display shows which type of call you are receiving.

To receive a data call

- 1. Connect your phone to the computer.
- 2. Answer the call from within the computer program (if it is not answered automatically).

Note: You cannot answer an incoming data call by pressing the **YES** key on the phone, but you can reject the call by pressing **NO**.

Receiving Data Calls - One Number

If you have a SIM card that does not support separate voice and data numbers, the phone does not recognize the type of incoming call. If you want to receive a voice or data call, you first have to set the phone to one of these options in the **Next incoming** sub-menu.





To receive a voice or data call

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Next call, YES, Next incoming, YES.
- Select the call type you want (Voice or Data) and press YES to confirm your choice.
- 3. Connect your phone to the computer.
- 4. Answer the call from within the program.

Once you have set your phone for a specific incoming call, it remains set until you change it.

Sending and Receiving E-mail from Your PC

You can use the phone's built-in modem to send or receive e-mail from your PC.

To send e-mail messages from your PC

- Install modem drives on your PC for your phone's built-in modem. You do this from the CD that comes with your phone.
- 2. In the Dial-Up Networking service on your computer, select Ericsson R520 as the modern you wish to use.
- Place your mobile phone next to your computer. Make sure it is connected according to the instructions for the transfer method you are using.
- 4. Start your e-mail program, then write and send a message.

To receive e-mail messages from your PC

- 1. See steps 1 and 2 above.
- Start your e-mail program and open your Inbox to read your new e-mail messages.



Profiles

Your phone includes a number of pre-programmed profiles. A profile is a group of settings which suit a certain environment. Some phone accessories select a profile automatically. For example, when you place your phone in a car handsfree unit, the **In car** profile is chosen.

Selecting a Profile

There are seven pre-programmed profiles:

- Normal
- Meeting
- In Car
- Outdoors
- Port h-free (portable handsfree)
- Home
- Office

When you buy your phone, it is set to the **Normal** profile. If you select a profile other than **Normal**, the name of the profile is shown in standby.

A profile with no accessories associated, such as **Meeting** or **Normal**, must be chosen manually.

To select a profile

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Select profile, YES.
- 2. Select a profile and press YES.

Using Your Voice

You can select a profile by using your voice, but first you need to activate the voice profile function and record a voice command. See "Changing Profiles" on page 78.

To select a profile using your voice

- 1. Press and hold **YES** until you hear a tone.
- 2. Release **YES** and say your voice command for the profile.

Tip: You can make the phone remind you to switch profile, for example, before a meeting begins. See "Calendar Settings" on page 59.

Select profile
View profile
Edit profile
Reset profiles

Changing the Profile Settings

You cannot create more profiles, but you can change the settings for a profile. Use the **View profile** function to see what settings are included in a certain profile.

To view your profiles

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Select profile, YES.
- 2. Select the profile you want to view and press YES.
- Scroll to View profile and press YES. The settings for the profile in use appear.

To change a profile setting

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Edit profile, YES.
- 2. Select a setting and press YES.
- **3.** Change the profile setting according to your wishes. The settings remain until you change them again.

To change the name of a profile

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Edit profile, YES, Profile name, YES.
- 2. Enter a new name and press YES.

With the **Reset Profiles** function, you can change all profile settings back to the way they were when you bought your phone.

To reset the profile settings

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Reset profiles, YES.
- 2. Answer **YES** if you are sure you want to reset all profiles.

Accessories

A specific profile is chosen automatically when you use the phone together with a certain accessory. Every time you disconnect your phone from the accessory, the profile is changed to the one which was active before.

Note: Contact your local Ericsson retailer for more information about accessories.

Adding Accessories to a Profile

You can add one or more accessories to any profile, except the **Normal** profile. For example, if you usually use a portable handsfree together with a specific charger, you may add the charger to the **Port h-free** profile. When you connect the phone to the charger, the phone recognizes it and switches profile automatically.

When you want to add an accessory to a specific profile, you must first activate that profile. See "To select a profile" on page 73.

To add an accessory to a profile

 Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Edit profile, YES, Accessories, YES.

Now you are in the list of the accessories already associated with the profile.

- 2. Select Add accessory? and press YES
- 3. Select an accessory and press YES.

Note: An accessory cannot be associated with more than one profile.

To remove an accessory from a profile

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Profiles, YES, Edit profile, YES, Accessories, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the accessory that you want to remove and press ©.
- 3. Delete? appears. Press YES.

Voice Control

With your phone, you can:

- voice dial call someone by saying the name and number type
- answer and reject calls with your voice when using a handsfree kit
- change profile with your voice
- record or listen to voice memos by using voice commands
- · activate the voice control by saying a "magic word"

You can save up to 50 voice commands altogether. When recording voice commands, make sure you are in a quiet environment.

Before Voice Dialling

Before you can start voice dialling, you need to turn on the voice dialling function and record your voice commands.

To turn voice dialling on and record number types

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Voice dialling, YES,
- Select On and press YES. Now you are going to record a voice command for each number type you use with your phone book contacts, for example "home", "mobile" and so on.
- 3. Instructions appear. Press YES.
- 4. Select a number type and press **YES**.
- Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say the number type that you want to record. The voice command is played back to you.
- Press YES to save the voice command. If the recording is not OK, press NO and repeat step 5.

You also need to record voice commands for each contact, that is the name, for example "John".

To record a contact name

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice commands, YES, Contacts, YES, Add voice, YES.
- 2. Enter the first letter of the contact name and press YES.
- Select a contact and press YES.
- 4. Follow the instructions in the display.



Voice commands Now record the number types you will call by voice dialling. Select an



An icon appears next to the contact names which have a voice command.

Caller Name

You can choose whether you want to hear the recorded voice command for a name when you receive an incoming call.

To turn the caller name on or off

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Caller name, YES.
- Select On or Off.

Voice Dialling

To make a call

- 1. From standby, press and hold **YES** until you hear a tone.
- Release YES, lift the phone to your ear and say a name, for example "John". The name is played back to you. If you have saved several numbers for that contact:
 - After a second tone, say a number type that you have recorded earlier, for example "home".

The number type is played back to you, and the call is connected.

From standby, you can also initiate voice dialling, voice profiles and voice control of voice memos by:

- sliding and holding the volume key.
- pressing and holding the handsfree button (when using a portable handsfree or a *Bluetooth* headset).
- saying the magic word. See "The Magic Word" on page 79.

Voice Answering

You can answer or reject incoming calls by using your voice, when using a portable handsfree, a car handsfree kit or the speakerphone.

To turn on voice answering and record voice answer commands

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Voice answer, YES.
- Select the accessories you want to be able to use with voice answering by pressing (**a).
- 3. Press **YES** to continue.
- 4. Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say "Answer", or another word, and press **YES**. If the recording was not OK, press **NO** and repeat step 4.
- **5.** Say "Busy", or another word. Press **YES** to save your recordings.



After the tone, say: ANSWER

To answer an incoming call using voice commands

When the phone rings, say "Answer".

"Answer" is played back to you and the call is connected.

To reject an incoming call using voice commands

When the phone rings, say "Busy".

"Busy" is played back to you and the call is rejected. The caller hears a busy tone.

Changing Profiles

If you record voice commands for your profiles, you can change profile with your voice.

To turn on and record profile commands

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Voice profiles, YES.
- 2. Select On and press YES.
- 3. Instructions appear. Press YES.
- 4. Select a profile and press **YES**.
- 5. Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say the profile name. Repeat steps 4 and 5 to record voice commands for the other profiles.

To change a profile using voice commands

- 1. From standby, press and hold **YES** until you hear a tone.
- Release YES, lift the phone to your ear and say the profile command for the required profile. The profile command is played back to you and the current profile is changed.

Recording Voice Memos

Instead of using the voice memo button, you can record voice commands to start a voice memo recording or to listen to voice memos.

To turn on and record voice memo commands

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Voice memo, YES.
- 2. Select On and press YES.
- 3. Instructions appear. Press YES.
- 4. Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say "Record".
- 5. Say "Play" and press **YES** to save your recordings.



To start a voice memo recording using a voice command

- 1. From standby, press and hold **YES** until you hear a tone.
- Release YES, lift the phone to your ear and say "Record". The voice command is played back to you and a tone indicates that the recording has begun.

To end the recording, press YES.

To listen to voice memo recordings using a voice command

- 1. From standby, press and hold **YES** until you hear a tone.
- Release YES, lift the phone to your ear and say "Play". The voice command is played back to you.
- 3. Listen to your voice memo recordings. Press NO to stop.

The Magic Word

You can record a magic word and use it as a voice command to allow totally handsfree access to voice control. Instead of pressing and holding **YES**, you say the magic word and then one of your recorded voice commands. The magic word is especially suitable when driving a car with a car handsfree kit installed, because you use external power instead of the battery power of your phone. You can also use the magic word when the phone is connected to a portable handsfree or when the speakerphone is activated.

Tip: Choose a long, unusual word which can easily be distinguished from ordinary background speech.

To turn on and record the magic word

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Magic word, YES.
- 2. Select the accessories you want to be able to use with the magic word by pressing (****). Press **YES**.
- 3. Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say the magic word.

Turn off the magic word when you no longer need totally handsfree access, in order to save battery power.

You can use the magic word whenever the speakerphone function is activated, but first you need to select the **speaker mode**.

To select the speaker mode

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice settings, YES, Magic word, YES.
- 2. Select Speaker mode by pressing 💉 . Press YES.

After the tone, say your magic word

Editing Your Voice Commands

In **Voice commands** you find all your voice commands. You can keep them up to date by re-recording them or deleting the ones you do not use.

To re-record a voice command

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Voice control, YES, Voice commands, YES.
- 2. Select the type of voice command and press YES.
- 3. Select a voice command and press YES.
- Select Replace voice and press YES.
 To listen to a recorded voice command, select Play voice.
- 5. Lift the phone to your ear, wait for the tone and say the command.

You can also edit the voice command for a contact name in **Edit** contact in the **Phone book** menu.

Problems when Recording

If your phone cannot detect speech, one of the following might have happened:

- you spoke too softly try speaking more loudly
- you held the phone too far away hold it as you do during a call
- the voice command was too short it should be around one second long
- you spoke too late or too soon speak immediately after the tone

Voice Memo

With the voice memo function, you can record up to 90 seconds of your own messages or parts of calls.

Recording Voice Memos

The voice memo function is always available. The voice memos are saved in your mobile phone and can be accessed even if you change your SIM card.

To record a voice memo

 Press the voice memo button until you hear a tone and then release it. When the recording starts, the display shows **Recording** together with the remaining recording time.

To end the recording

 Press the voice memo button. The display shows Voice memo saved.

Tip: You can start recording or listening to voice memos with a voice command. See "Recording Voice Memos" on page 78.

The recording stops automatically if you receive an incoming call or when the call ends. You hear a tone five seconds before the voice memory is full.

Who to Record During Calls?

If a call is in progress and you start recording a voice memo, your phone starts recording the other person by default. You can choose to record either yourself or the person you are talking to during a call.

To select who to record

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Voice memo, YES, During calls, YES.
- 2. Select Record myself or Record other and press YES.

Note: In some countries you are required by law to inform the person you are talking to that you are recording him/her.

Listening to Voice Memos

You can listen to your voice memos at any time, except during a call.

To listen to your voice memos

- 1. Press the voice memo button.
- 2. Scroll to the voice memo you wish to hear.
- 3. Press the voice memo button. If you want to:
 - Pause, press YES. Press YES again to play
 - go to next or previous: press or , respectively.
 - go fast forward or rewind: press and hold or or or respectively.
- 4. Press **NO** to stop playback.

Tip: To see how many seconds you have left for recording, scroll to the memory indicator bar at the top of the Memo list and press **YES**.

Editing Voice Memos

To erase or rename a voice memo

- 1. Briefly press the voice memo button.
- 2. Use to scroll to the voice memo you wish to erase or rename.
- 3. Press () when the voice memo is highlighted.
- 4. Select Erase or Rename and press YES.

You can also erase or rename a voice memo when you pause during playback.

To erase all voice memos

Scroll to Extras, YES, Voice memo, YES, Erase all, YES.

Recording Quality

In standby mode, you can record your voice memo in two different modes. You can choose to record either 36 seconds of high quality sound, or 92 seconds of normal quality sound.

To set the recording quality

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Voice memo, YES, Set quality, YES.
- 2. Select a recording quality and press **YES**.



Settings

You can choose to show the date, time or length of the voice memo.

To set the view of your voice memos

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Voice memo, YES, Set view, YES.
- 2. Scroll to **Date recorded** and press (**) if you do not want this information to be shown. The tick in the box disappears. Press (**) again if you want the information to be shown. The tick reappears. Repeat the procedure for **Time recorded** and **Length**.
- 3. Press YES.





Voice Mail Service





The answering service of your network allows callers to leave a voice message when you cannot answer your calls.

Some operators inform you by sending a specific **Voice mail** indication. If this is the case, the voice mail icon appears in the display. Most operators, however, inform you by sending a text message, asking you to call your **Voice mail service**.

Calling Your Voice Mail

You can save the number of your voice mail service to be able to call your voice mail service by simply pressing and holding **1**. The number is provided by your network operator.

To save your voice mail number

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Voice mailno., YES.
- Enter your voice mail number and press YES.

Note: The number of your voice mail service may be different if you are calling from a network that is not your home network.

When you receive a voice mail, your phone beeps and the message **New voice mail** appears in the display (only if you receive the specific voice mail indication). If you want to check your voice mail now, press **YES** to call your voice mail service.

If you press **NO**, you can call your voice mail service later to listen to your recorded messages.

To call your voice mail service

- Press and hold 1 from standby mode, or:
 - Scroll to Messages, YES, Call voice mail, YES.

Message Alert Signal

You can change the signal that notifies you of a new message.

To change the message alert signal

- 1. Scroll to Messages, YES, Options, YES, Message alert, YES.
- Select a signal and press YES.






Diverting Calls



You can use the **Divert calls** service to divert incoming calls to another phone number when you are unable to answer.

For voice calls, you can choose between the following divert alternatives:

- **Divert always** divert all voice calls.
- When busy divert calls if you are already on the phone.
- No reply divert calls that you do not answer within a specified time limit.
- Not reachable divert calls if your phone is turned off or if you are unreachable.



Tip: If you place your phone in an Ericsson Desktop Charger, your calls may be diverted automatically.

Activating Divert Calls To turn on the Divert calls function

1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Divert calls, YES.

- 2. Select a call type and press YES.
- Select a divert alternative and press YES.
- 4. Select Activate and press YES.
- 5. Enter the phone number, including the area code, to which you want your calls to be diverted and then press **YES**.

Note: When the Restricted calls function is on, some Divert calls options cannot be activated.



- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Divert calls, YES.
- 2. Select a call type and press **YES**.
- 3. Scroll to the divert you want to check and press YES.
- 4. Select Get status and press YES.

To check the status of all Divert calls

 Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Divert calls, YES, Check all, YES.

More than One Call



You can also set up a **Conference call** to have a joint conversation with up to four other people.

Note: Depending on whether a call is ongoing or not, either the Call info menu or the Ongoing call menu is shown.

You can also reach the different options described below, for example, to hold a call or switch calls, by pressing (3).

Call Waiting Service

If you wish to be able to receive a second call while another call is in progress, you must turn on the **Call waiting** service.

Note: If you are engaged in a data call, any other incoming calls are rejected.

To turn on the Call waiting service

 Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Call waiting, YES, Activate, YES. There may be a short delay before the network responds.

To cancel the Call waiting service

 Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Call waiting, YES, Cancel, YES.

To check whether the Call waiting service is on or not

Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Call waiting, YES,
 Get status, YES.

Making a Second Call

You can only put one call on hold while you make a second call.

To make a second call

- 1. Put the current call on hold by pressing **YES**.
- 2. Enter the number you wish to call and press **YES** or press and hold () to retrieve the number from your phone book.







Receiving a Second Call

If the **Call waiting** service is on, you hear a tone in the earpiece if you receive a second call. The number or name of the caller is normally shown at the top of the display together with a list of the alternatives: **Answer**, **Busy** and **Release&answer**. If the incoming call is a restricted number, the display shows **Withheld**.

To put the ongoing call on hold and answer the waiting call

Press YES to answer the waiting call.
 The current call is now put on hold.

To continue the ongoing call and reject the waiting call

Select Busy and press YES.
 The waiting call is rejected.

Note: If Divert when busy is on, the waiting call is diverted to the number you have specified.

To end the ongoing call and answer the waiting call

Select Release&answer and press YES.

Handling Two Calls

When you have one active call and one call on hold, you can do one of the following:

To switch between the two calls

Press YES.

To end the active call and return to the call on hold

- 1. Press NO. The question Retrieve call? appears.
- 2. Press YES.

If you press **NO**, the call on hold is also ended.

To end both calls

Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Release all, YES.

To connect the two calls

Scroll to **Ongoing call**, **YES**, **Transfer call**, **YES**. The two calls are now connected to each other, and you are disconnected from both. Please contact your network operator for charging details.

To join the two calls into a Conference call

Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Join calls, YES.

See 'Conference calls' below.

Receiving a Third Call

If the Call waiting service is on, you may receive a third call when you have one active call and a second call on hold. From now on, you cannot answer any more calls without disconnecting one, unless you create a conference call. You hear a tone in the earpiece and **Busy** and **Release&answer** appear in the display.

To end the ongoing call and accept the waiting call

Select Release&answer and press YES.

The waiting call becomes active and the call on hold remains on hold

To reject the waiting call

Select Busy and press YES. The caller hears a busy tone.
 The third call is rejected.

Conference Calls

In a conference call, you can have a joint conversation with up to four other people.

Creating a Conference Call

To create a conference call, you must have one active call and one call on hold.

To join the two calls into a conference call

Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Join calls, YES.

Adding New Participants

You can put the conference group on hold and then add new participants.

To add a new participant

- 1. Press **YES** to put the conference group on hold.
- 2. Call the next person you wish to include in the conference group.
- 3. Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Join calls, YES.

To check the participants in the conference group

1. Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Parties in conf, YES.

The first participant's phone number is displayed, if available. Otherwise the display shows part 1, 2 etc.

2. Scroll with () to check the other participants.



Having a Private Conversation

You can have a private conversation with one of the participants and put the other participants on hold.

To extract a participant

- 1. Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Extract part, YES.
- Select the participant and press YES.

You may now have a private conversation with the participant.

To rejoin the participant to the conference group

Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Join calls, YES.

Releasing Participants

You can release participants from the conference group one by one or all at once

To release a participant

- Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Release part, YES.
- 2. Select the participant and press YES.

To release all participants

Scroll to Ongoing call, YES, Release all, YES.

Making a Call during a Conference Call

You can put the conference group on hold and make another call. You can then switch between the new call and the conference call.

To put the conference group on hold and make a new call

- 1. Press YES.
- 2. Enter the number you wish to call and press **YES**.

To switch between the new call and the conference group

Press YES

To end the new call and return to the conference group

Press NO and then YES.

Ending the Conference Call

Press NO.

Call Time and Call Cost



During a call, the duration is shown in the display. If you subscribe to cost information, the call cost (or the number of call units) is displayed instead.

Checking the Time or Cost

The **Call info** menu allows you to check the total time or cost of your calls. You can also check the call time and cost by pressing .

To check the call time of the last call

Scroll to Call info, YES, Call timers, YES, Last Call, YES.

To check the call time of your outgoing calls

Scroll to Call info, YES, Call timers, YES, Outgoing time, YES.

To check the total call time

Scroll to Call info, YES, Call timers, YES, Total time, YES.

To reset the total call time

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call timers, YES, Reset timers, YES.
- 2. Select Total time or Outgoing time and press YES.

To check the cost of the last call

Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Last call, YES.

To check the total call cost

Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Total cost, YES.

To reset the total call cost

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Clear total cost, YES.
- 2. Press YES to confirm your choice.

Note: If you subscribe to cost information, you must enter your PIN2 to clear the cost or time counter. For details about PIN2, please contact your network operator.

Setting the Call Cost

You can use the **Tariff** function to specify the price per call unit. The price entered is saved on your SIM card.







Note: If you do not specify a price per call unit, the number of call units is displayed during a call, and in Last call and Total cost in the Call info menu.

To enter the price per call unit

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Set tariff, YES.
- 2. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.
- 3. Select Change tariff and press YES.
- Enter the currency you want, for example GBP for Pounds Sterling, and press YES.
- 5. Enter the price per call unit, for example 0.75, and press **YES**. To enter a decimal point, press (*\(\phi\)).

To revert to call units

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES Call costs, YES, Set tariff, YES.
- 2. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.
- 3. Select **Units** and press **YES**.

Credit Limit for Calls

You can enter a total amount of money that can be used for making calls. When the amount reaches zero, no more calls can be made.

To set a specific credit limit

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Set credit, YES.
- 2. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.
- 3. Select Change credit and press YES.
- 4. Enter the amount, for example 30 pounds, and press YES.

To set unlimited credit

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call costs, YES, Set credit, YES.
- Enter your PIN2 and press YES.
- 3. Select Unlimited and press YES.

Minute Minder

If you turn on the minute minder, you hear a beep once every minute during a call as a reminder of the duration of the ongoing call.

To turn the minute minder on or off

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Call timers, YES, Minute minder, YES.
- 2. Select **On** or **Off** and press **YES**.





Networks

Searching for Networks

When you turn on the phone, it searches for the last accessed network. If this is not within range, you may use another network, provided your home network has an agreement that allows you to do so. This is called roaming.

To start an automatic network search

Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, New search, YES.
 The phone automatically starts searching for a network according to the list of preferred networks saved on your SIM card.

To select a network

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Select network, YES.
- 2. Select a network and press YES.

The network you are currently using is marked with a filled button. The following information is also shown:

| The display | y shows | meaning |
|-------------|---------|---------|
|-------------|---------|---------|

| $\hat{\mathbf{\Omega}}$ | Your home network is within range. |
|-------------------------|---|
| ₩ | The name of the network is included in a list of preferred networks on your SIM card. You can use this network. |

All other networks without any icons are available.

If your home network and a forbidden network come to an agreement that allows you to use the forbidden network, you can select this network even though the message **Forbidden** is displayed.

Preferred Networks

You can create and edit a list that defines the order in which your phone selects a network during an automatic network search, when your home network is not within range.



The number of networks that can be saved in the list depends on your SIM card.

To view the list of networks

Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Preferred nets, YES.
 The name of the first network is displayed.

Use \(\rightarrow \) or \(\rightarrow \) to scroll through the networks in the list.

To see a network's full name

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Preferred nets, YES.
- 2. Scroll to a network and press YES.
- 3. Select Full name and press YES.

To add a network to the list

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Preferred nets, YES, Add new?, YES.
- Scroll to a network and press YES.
 If the network you want does not appear in the list, scroll to Other and press YES. Enter the three-digit country number and the two-digit network number and press YES. For details, please contact your network operator.
- 3. Enter a position number and press YES.

To delete a network from the list

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Preferred nets, YES.
- 2. Scroll to a network and press *c*, **YES**.

To rearrange the list

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Preferred nets, YES.
- 2. Scroll to a network and press YES.
- 3. Select Change priority and press YES.
- 4. Enter the new position within the list and press **YES**.

Search Modes

When you turn on your phone, it searches for a network. This can be done in two different ways:

Automatic search mode means that your phone first searches for the last accessed network. If this is not available, it automatically searches for another available network within range.

Manual search mode means that your phone first searches for the last accessed network. If this is not available, the question **Select net?** appears. You then need to choose a network as described in "Searching for Networks" on page 93.



To turn on the automatic or manual search mode

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Networks, YES, Search mode, YES.
- 2. Select Automatic or Manual, and press YES.

Security

You can protect your phone and subscription from unauthorized use in several ways. For example, you can lock the phone or subscribe to specific services such as the Restrict Calls service.

Locking the SIM Card

The SIM card lock protects your subscription, but not your phone itself, from unauthorized use. If you change SIM cards, the phone still works with the new SIM card.

Most SIM cards are locked at the time of purchase. If the SIM card lock is on, you have to enter your PIN (Personal Identity Number) every time you turn on your phone. If you enter your PIN incorrectly three times in a row, the SIM card is blocked. This is indicated by the message **PIN blocked**. To unblock it you need to enter your PUK (Personal Unblocking Key). Your PIN and your PUK are supplied by your network operator.

To unblock your SIM card

- 1. PIN blocked appears.
- 2. Enter your PUK (or PUK2) and press YES.
- 3. Enter a new four- to eight-digit PIN (or PIN2) and press YES.
- 4. Re-enter the new PIN (or PIN2) to confirm and press YES.

Note: If you enter the wrong PUK ten times in a row, your card is permanently blocked. If this happens, you should contact your network operator.

To change your PIN

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, SIM lock, YES, Change PIN, YES.
- Enter your old PIN and press YES.
- 3. Enter your new PIN and press YES.
- 4. Re-enter your new PIN to confirm and press YES.

To change your PIN 2

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, SIM lock, YES, Change PIN2, YES.
- 2. Proceed as described in "To change your PIN" above.

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, SIM lock, YES, Protection, YES.
- Select On or Off, enter your PIN and press YES.
 The message Locked or Unlocked confirms that the card lock has now been turned on or off.

Locking the Phone

The phone lock protects the phone against unauthorized use if it is stolen and the SIM card exchanged. It is not on when you buy the phone. We recommend that you change the phone lock code (0000) to any four- to eight-digit personal code. The phone lock can be **On**, **Automatic** or **Off**.

To set the phone lock to on, automatic or off

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, Phone lock, YES, Protection, YES.
- Select On, Automatic or Off. The current setting is not available in the list
- 3. Enter the phone lock code and press **YES**.

If the phone lock is **On**, the message **Phone locked Phone lock code:** appears each time you turn on the phone. You have to enter your code followed by **YES** to use your phone.

If the phone lock is set to **Automatic**, you do not need to enter your phone lock code until a different SIM card is inserted in the phone.

Changing the phone lock code

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, Phone lock, YES, Change code, YES.
- 2. Follow the steps described in "To change your PIN" on page 96.

Note: If you should forget your new code, you have to hand in your phone to your local Ericsson retailer or service point to have the phone unlocked.

Locking the Keypad

With the keypad lock on, you avoid accidental dialling, for example, if you keep your phone in your pocket. You can set the keypad lock manually or select the automatic keylock. Automatic keylock means that if no keys are pressed in 25 seconds, the keypad is locked.

Note: You can call the emergency number even if the keypad is locked. If the phone alarm rings, you can turn it off by pressing any key.

The keypad is locked until you:

- answer an incoming call.
- read an incoming message.
- replace the battery.
- unlock the keypad.

To lock the keypad manually

- 1. From standby, press (3).
- 2. Select Turn on keylock and press YES.

To unlock the keypad manually

Press c. The question Turn off keylock? appears. Press YES.

To set the automatic keylock on or off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES, Auto keylock, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Note: The keypad lock is always turned off if the phone is connected to a car handsfree.

Restricting Calls

You can use the **Restrict calls** service to restrict certain types of calls that can be made and received. You need a password, which comes with your subscription from the network operator, to turn a call restriction on or off.

The following calls can be restricted:

- all outgoing calls, All outgoing
- all outgoing international calls, Outgoing Intl
- all outgoing international calls except to your home country, Outg
 Intl roam
- all incoming calls, All incoming
- all incoming calls when you are abroad (when roaming), Inc when roam

To turn a call restriction on or off

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Restrict calls, YES.
- 2. Scroll to an option and press YES.
- Select Activate or Cancel and press YES.
- 4. Enter your password and press **YES**.





Restrict calls
1All outgoing
2Outgoing intl
3Outg intl roam
4All incoming

- To cancel all call restrictions, select Cancel all.
- To check the status of a call restriction, select the call restriction option and then **Get status**.
- To change the password, select Change passwd.

Note: If you divert incoming calls, you cannot turn on some Restrict calls options.

Fixed Dialling

The **Fixed dialling** function allows calls to be made only to certain numbers saved on the SIM card. If an attempt is made to call other numbers, the message **Number not permitted** appears in the display. Fixed dialling requires a SIM card that allows fixed numbers to be saved. The fixed numbers are protected by your PIN2.

Note: Emergency calls can still be made, even when Fixed dialling is on.

To turn Fixed dialling on or off

- $\textbf{1.} \ \ \textbf{Scroll to Phone book}, \textbf{YES}, \textbf{Options}, \textbf{YES}, \textbf{Fixed dialling}, \textbf{YES}.$
- **2.** Enter your PIN2 and press **YES**.
- 3. Select On or Off and press YES.

To save fixed numbers

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Special numbers, YES, Fixed numbers, YES, Add new?, YES.
- 2. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.
- 3. Enter the fixed number and press YES.
- Enter the name you want to associate with the number and press YES.

Closed User Groups

The **Closed user group** function is another way of lowering call costs. On some networks it is cheaper to make calls within a call group. Your network operator can place certain numbers in groups. You can have a maximum of 10 groups.

To add a closed user group

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Closed groups, YES, Edit list, YES.
- 2. Scroll to Add new? and press YES.
- 3. Enter the name of the user group and press YES.





Enter the index number of the group and press YES.
 The index numbers are provided by your network operator.

To activate a closed user group

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Closed groups, YES, Edit list, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the group you want and press **YES**.
- 3. Select Activate and press YES.

Calls can be made only within the selected user group.

To call outside closed user groups

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Closed groups, YES, Open calls, YES.
- 2. Select On and press YES.

Accepting Calls

With the **Accept calls** service, you can choose to receive calls only from certain numbers that you have in your phone book. Other calls are automatically rejected by a busy tone. You have to save the numbers that you want to receive in an **Accepted list**. The rejected calls are saved in the **Call list** in the **Call info** menu.

To add numbers to the list of accepted callers

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Accept calls, YES, Edit list, YES, Add to list?, YES.
- 2. Select **Phone book** (you can add a contact's number) or **Groups** (you can add a group).
- 3. Enter the first letter of the contact or group and press **YES**.
- 4. Scroll to the number or group you want to add and press YES.

To set the accept options

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Call options, YES, Accept calls, YES, Accept options, YES.
- 2. Select one of the following:
 - From list you only receive calls from callers in the Accepted list. All other incoming calls will be rejected. The caller hears a busy tone and you get no indication of incoming calls.
 - From no one All incoming calls are rejected.
 - From all You receive all calls as normal.



Code Memo

Instead of having to remember all the different security codes for credit cards etc, you can save them in the Code memo in your phone. Then all you need to remember is the password to open the Code memo. You can save a maximum of 10 codes in the Code memo.

Checkword and Security

To confirm that you have entered the correct password for the Code memo and to prevent unauthorized access to your codes, you must enter a **Checkword**. When you enter your password to open the Code memo, the checkword is shown for a short time. If the password is correct, the correct codes are shown. If you enter the incorrect password, the checkword and the codes that are shown are also incorrect

Factors strengthening the security of the Code memo function are:

- You get no feedback about whether the password is correct, except for the checkword, and only you know the checkword.
- All codes are encrypted in the mobile phone.
- When you access your codes, they are shown for a limited time only.

Using Code Memo

To open Code memo for the first time

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Code memo, YES.
 A message with instructions appears.
- 2. Press YES.
- 3. Enter a four-digit password to open Code memo and press YES.
- 4. Re-enter the new password to confirm.
- Enter a checkword (maximum 15 characters) and press YES.
 The checkword can consist of both letters and numbers. To enter a number, press and hold the key.

To add a new code

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Code memo, YES.
- 2. Enter your password.
- 3. Select Add new code? and press YES.

- Enter a name associated with the code, for example, the name of the credit card company, and press YES.
- 5. Enter the code and press YES.

To open Code memo

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Code memo, YES.
- 2. Enter your password and press YES.

Your entered checkword appears. When the decryption process has finished, your codes are shown.

Deleting and Editing Codes

To delete a single code

- 1. Open Code memo as described above.
- 2. Scroll to the code you want to delete and press ©.
- 3. Delete? appears. Press YES.

To edit a code

- 1. Open Code memo as described above.
- Scroll to the code you want to edit and press YES. Press YES again.
- 3. Select **Edit** and press **YES**.
- 4. Enter the name and press **YES**, enter the code and press **YES**.

Changing the Password

- 1. Open Code memo as described above.
- 2. Scroll to Options, YES, Chg password, YES.
- 3. Enter your new password and press YES.
- 4. Re-enter the new password and press **YES**.
- 5. Enter a checkword and press YES.

Forgot Your Password?


If you forget your password, just enter any password to access the Code memo function. The checkword and codes that are then shown are incorrect. You must now reset the Code memo.

To reset Code memo

- 1. Scroll to Options, YES, Reset, YES.
- 2. Reset code memo? appears. Press YES.

The Code memo is reset and all entries are cleared. The next time you enter the Code memo, you must start at "To open Code memo for the first time" on page 101.

Changing the Name

When you buy your phone, the names of the lines are normally line 1 and line 2, but you can change their names.

To change the name of a line

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Display, YES, Edit line tags, YES.
- 2. Select a line and press **YES**.
- 3. Enter a new name and press YES.

Changing Lines

Once you have chosen a line, all outgoing calls are made on this line until you change it again. An icon indicates the line currently chosen for outgoing calls.

Note: *Incoming calls can be received on both lines, irrespective of the line currently chosen.*

To change phone lines

- 1. Scroll to Call info, YES, Next call, YES.
- 2. Select Switch to line 1 or Switch to line 2 and press YES.



Locking One Line

You can choose to lock one of the lines, so that it cannot be used unless you enter the PIN2.

To lock a phone line

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES.
- Select the phone line you want to lock: Lock line 1 or Lock line 2. Press YES.
- 3. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.

To unlock a phone line

- 1. Scroll to Settings, YES, Locks, YES.
- Select the phone line you want to unlock: Unlock line 1 or Unlock line 2. Press YES.
- 3. Enter your PIN2 and press YES.

Calling Card Calls

When making international or long distance calls, you may want to use the calling card service to redirect the charges to a credit card account, instead of your normal account.

Note: You cannot use the calling card service when making a data call.

Calling Card Service

To be able to make calling card calls, you need to turn on the service.

To turn on the calling card service

- Scroll to Phone book, YES, Options, YES, Set callingcards, YES.
- 2. Enter your phone lock code (0000) and press YES.
- Select On and press YES.
 The Calling card service is now on and the sub-menu Calling cards is available in the Phone book menu.

Saving Calling Card Numbers

You can save two calling card numbers in your phone.

To save a card number

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Calling cards, YES.
- 2. Enter your phone lock code and press YES.
- 3. Select Add new? and press YES.
- 4. Enter the access number of the calling card server and press YES.
- Enter a name that you want to associate with your calling card server and press YES.
- Enter the verification code of the calling card server and press YES.
- Select which you want to send first the number that you want to call or the verification code - and press YES to confirm your choice.

Note: *Verification codes are provided by your network operator.*

Calling cards Phone lock code:

To delete a card number

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Calling cards, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the card number that you want to delete and press C
- 3. Press YES.

To edit a card number

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Calling cards, YES.
- 2. Scroll to the card number that you want to edit and press YES.
- 3. Select **Edit** and edit the card number.
- 4. Press **YES** to confirm the new number.

Choosing a Card

If you have saved two card numbers, you must choose which card you want to use before making a calling card call.

To select a card

- 1. Scroll to Phone book, YES, Calling cards, YES.
- 2. Enter your phone lock code and press YES.
- 3. Select the card that you want to use and press YES.
- 4. Select Activate card and press YES.

Making a Calling Card Call

- 1. Enter the phone number you wish to call or retrieve it from the phone book by pressing and holding —.
- 2. Press and hold YES.
 - The access number of the calling card server is called. During the connecting phase, you are asked to send the phone number that you want to call and the verification code, in the order chosen earlier (see above).
- Press YES when the display shows Send or wait a few seconds and the number and code are sent automatically.

Games

Your phone includes two games: Tennis and Erix.

Tennis

You can play **Tennis** by yourself or against a user of another R520 phone using *Bluetooth* wireless technology or the infrared port. You play seven sets.

Tip: Read about "Bluetooth™ Wireless Technology" on page 49 and "Infrared Port" on page 54.

To start Tennis

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Games, YES, Tennis, YES.
- To start a new game, press 1.
 (Press 2 to resume a game and press 3 for help.)
- 3. If you want to have sound effects, press 1. If not, press 2.
- 4. Select how you want to play:
 - Single you play against the phone: select difficulty level by pressing 1 or 2. Press 1 and start playing.
 - Two, one phone you and another person play against each other on the same phone: press 2 and start playing.
 - Two, two phones you and another person play against each other on your phones via *Bluetooth* wireless technology or via the infrared port: press 3.

If you select **Two**, **two phones**, proceed as follows:

- 5. Select a transfer method by pressing 1(IR) or 2 (Bluetooth).
- Select if you want to initiate a game or if you want to join a game:
 - Invite others your phone searches for other nearby players who have selected Accept others (see below): press 1.
 When a player is found, the game starts automatically.
 - Accept others your phone waits to be found by another player who has selected **Invite others** to initiate a game: press **2**.
- 7. When the phones have found each other, start playing.



To control Tennis

You are the tennis player on the left.

Erix

The object of Erix is to fill the display. You draw a line and when the line is connected at both ends, the contained area is filled. When you have filled approximately 75% of the display you move up to the next level. If a ball hits you or the line you are drawing, you lose a life.

To start Erix

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Games, YES, Erix, YES.
- 2. To start the game, press YES.

You can select difficulty level or resume the game by pressing —. Instead of selecting **Start**, you can select **Help** or **Highscores** at step 2.

To control Erix

• 5 = up, 0 = down, 7 = left, 9 = right

Tools

Alarm Clock

The phone has an alarm clock that can be set to ring at a specific time within 24 hours. You can also set a recurrent alarm to ring at a specific time on several days. For example, it can ring at 8 am on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. You can have both these alarms set at the same time. Even if you have set your phone to silent the alarm and timer signal rings.

To set an alarm

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Alarm, YES.
- 2. Enter the time.
- 3. Press **YES** to confirm your setting.

To change the time of an alarm

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Alarm, YES, New time, YES.
- 2. Enter the time and press **YES** to confirm your setting.

To turn the alarm signal off

Press any key to turn the alarm signal off when it rings.
 If you do not want the alarm to be repeated, press YES.

To cancel an alarm

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Alarm, YES.
- 2. Select Cancel and press YES.

To set a recurrent alarm

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Recurrent alarm, YES.
- 2. Enter the time and press **YES**.
- Select the days that you want the alarm to recur by scrolling and pressing **\(\phi\). Press **YES** to exit the menu.
 You can view the days in the **Recurrence rule** sub-menu.





To change the time for a recurrent alarm

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Recurrent alarm, YES
- 2. Select **New time** and press **YES**.
- 3. Enter the new time for your recurrent alarm and press YES.

To turn the alarm signal off

Press any key to turn the alarm signal off when it rings.
 If you do not want the alarm to be repeated, press YES.

To cancel a recurrent alarm

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Recurrent alarm, YES.

Motion Snooze

If you set the motion snooze to on, you can interrupt the alarm clock with a motion, for example, by moving your hand over the phone.

To turn motion snooze on or off

- Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Alarms, YES, Motion snooze, YES.
- 2. Select On or Off and press YES.

Alarm Signal

To change the alarm signal

- Scroll to Settings, YES, Sounds & alerts, YES, Alarm signal, YES.
- 2. Select a signal and press YES.

Stopwatch

The phone has a built-in stopwatch.

To run the stopwatch

- 1. Scroll to Extras, YES, Time, YES, Stopwatch, YES.
- 2. Press **YES** to start the stopwatch. Press **YES** again to stop it.

By pressing ** when the stopwatch is running, you can save up to nine lap times. Press ** or ** to check your saved lap times.

To reset the stopwatch

Timer

Online Services



Online services are customized services offered by network operators, independently of mobile phones and mobile phone manufacturers.

A SIM card which supports Online services works in the same way as a normal SIM card. When you have inserted your SIM card and turned on your phone, your network operator can download data to your SIM card. After the first data download and after restarting your phone, a new menu appears in your phone as the first sub-menu under the Extras menu.

To enter your new menu system

Scroll to Extras, YES, Online services, YES.

Note: This menu only appears if your SIM card supports this service. Some operators may not use the name "Online services". Your phone may not support all of the services offered.

Your network operator can, at any time, download new data, for example a new feature, to your SIM card. You may be notified by a message in your display.

Ericsson Mobile Internet

When you are on the move and in need of communication and information, the **Ericsson Mobile Internet** is the answer.

The Ericsson Mobile Internet is a service supplied by Ericsson to make it easier for you to communicate and receive information quickly, wherever you are. It gives you access to various messaging services, on-line customer services, user manuals and other useful information. Some WAP profiles can be set up from your PC at the Ericsson Mobile Internet. You can also download communications software to ensure you get the best out of your Ericsson products.

You can access the Ericsson Mobile Internet via the WAP browser in your phone and via the Internet browser on your computer.

Troubleshooting

Here are some problems that you might have while using your phone. Some problems require that you call your service provider, but most of the problems you encounter you can easily correct yourself.

Error Messages

Insert Card

There is no SIM card in the phone or you may have inserted it incorrectly. Insert a SIM card. See "SIM Card" on page 7.

Insert Correct SIM Card

The phone may have been locked by the network operator to work only with a certain SIM card. Insert the correct SIM card.

SOS Calls Only

You are within range of a network but you are not allowed to use it. However, in an emergency, some operators allow you to make an emergency call. See "Making Emergency Calls" on page 13.

No Network

There is no network within range or the received signal is too weak. You have to move to get a signal that is strong enough.

Wrong PIN, Wrong PIN2

You have entered your PIN or PIN2 incorrectly. Enter the correct PIN or PIN2, and press **YES**. See "Locking the SIM Card" on page 96.

Codes Do not Match

When you want to change a security code (for example your PIN) you have to confirm the new code by entering it again. The two codes that you have entered do not match. See "Locking the SIM Card" on page 96.

PIN/PIN2 Blocked

You have entered your PIN or PIN2 incorrectly three times in a row. To unblock, see "Locking the SIM Card" on page 96.

PUK Blocked - Contact Operator

You have entered your personal unblocking key code (PUK) incorrectly 10 times in a row. Contact your network operator.

Phone Locked

The phone is locked. To unlock the phone, see "Locking the Phone" on page 97.

Phone Lock Code:

Your phone comes with the phone lock code, **0000**. You can change it to any four- to eight-digit code. See "Locking the Phone" on page 97.

Number not Permitted

The **Fixed Dialling** function is on and the number you have dialled is not on your fixed numbers list. See "Fixed Dialling" on page 99.

Charging, Alien Battery

The battery you are using is not an Ericsson-approved battery and is charging slowly for safety reasons.

Other Problems

No Indication of Charging

When you start charging a battery that is empty or a battery that has not been used for a long time, it may take a while before the indicator on the top of the phone shows a red light and the battery meter appears.

Cannot Access a Certain Function

The function or service may be dependent on your SIM card or the network. Contact your network operator.

Cannot Receive Any Calls

- You may have diverted your incoming calls to another phone number. To cancel the **Divert calls** service, see "Cancelling Divert Calls" on page 86.
- You may have set the Accept Calls option to From no one or From list. Select From all. See "To set the accept options" on page 100.
- You may have selected **Data** as the next incoming call. Select **Voice**. See "To receive a voice or data call" on page 72.
- You may have selected **GPRS only** for a data account. Select **Automatic** instead. See "To create a data account" on page 62. If you still cannot receive incoming calls, it could be due to network limitations.

Cannot Speed Dial

Your contacts are not saved on the SIM card. To copy the contacts to the SIM card, see "To copy contacts to the SIM card" on page 37.







Cannot Access My Contacts

Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of mobile phones in the areas where you drive. If you are going to use your mobile phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving.
- Use an Ericsson Vehicle Handsfree Solution, if available. Law in many countries/states requires drivers to use a Vehicle Handsfree Solution. Read the installation instructions carefully before installing a Vehicle Handsfree Solution.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.

RF energy may affect some electronic systems in motor vehicles such as car stereo, safety equipment etc. In addition, some vehicle manufacturers do not allow use of mobile phones in their vehicles, unless the installation is supported by a handsfree kit with an external antenna. Check with your vehicle manufacturer's representative to be sure that your mobile phone will not affect the electronic systems in your vehicle.

Vehicles Equipped with an Air Bag

An air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, including either installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment, for example equipment in hospitals and cars, is shielded from RF energy. However, certain electronic equipment is not, therefore:

 Do not use your mobile phone near medical equipment without requesting permission.

Mobile phones may affect the operation of some implanted cardiac pacemakers and other medically implanted equipment. Pacemaker patients should be aware that the use of a mobile phone very close to a pacemaker might cause the device to malfunction. Aircraft

- Turn off your mobile phone before boarding any aircraft.
 To prevent interference with communication systems, you must not use your mobile phone while the plane is in the air.
- Do not use it on the ground without permission from the crew.

Blasting Areas

Turn off your mobile phone when in a blasting area or in areas posted "turn off two-way radio" to avoid interfering with blasting operations. Construction crews often use remote control RF devices to set off explosives.

Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your mobile phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere. It is rare, but your mobile phone or its accessories could generate sparks. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include fuelling areas, such as petrol stations, below deck on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, and areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders.

Do not transport or store flammable gas, liquid, or explosives in the same compartment of your vehicle that contains your mobile phone and accessories.

Power Supply

- Connect the AC power adapter only to designated power sources as marked on the product.
- To reduce risk of damage to the electric cord, remove it from the outlet by holding onto the AC adapter rather than the cord.
- Make sure the cord is positioned so that it will not be stepped on, tripped over or otherwise subjected to damage or stress.
- To reduce risk of electric shock, unplug the unit from any power source before attempting to clean it.
- The AC power adapter must not be used outdoors or in damp areas.

Emergency Calls

IMPORTANT!

This mobile phone, like any mobile phone, operates using radio signals, cellular and landline networks as well as user-programmed functions, which cannot guarantee connection under all conditions. Therefore you should never rely solely upon any mobile phone for essential communications (e.g. medical emergencies).

Remember, in order to make or receive calls, the mobile phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate cellular signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all cellular phone networks or when certain network services and/or mobile phone features are in use. Check with your local service provider.

Battery Information

Charging the Battery

The battery delivered with your phone is not fully charged. We recommend that you charge the battery for 4 hours before you use the phone for the first time. If you are charging a new battery, or a battery that has run out completely, it may take a while before you get any indication (the top indicator lights up and the battery meter appears in the display) that the battery is being charged.

Please note that you cannot turn on the phone before the indicator lights up and the battery meter appears in the display. The battery can only be charged in temperatures between $+5^{\circ}$ C ($+41^{\circ}$ F) and $+45^{\circ}$ C ($+113^{\circ}$ F).

Battery Use and Care


