## Safety and General Information

IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON SAFE AND EFFICIENT OPERATION. READ THIS INFORMATION BEFORE USING YOUR PHONE.
The information provided in this document supersedes the general safety information in user guides published prior to December 1, 2002.

## Exposure To Radio Frequency (RF) Energy

Your phone contains a transmitter and a receiver. When it is ON, it receives and transmits RF energy. When you communicate with your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level at which your phone transmits.
Your Motorola phone is designed to comply with local regulatory requirements in your country concerning exposure of human beings to RF energy.

## Operational Precautions

To assure optimal phone performance and make sure human exposure to RF energy is within the guidelines set forth in the relevant standards, always adhere to the following procedures.

## External Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or Motorola-approved replacement antenna. Unauthorised antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone.

Do NOT hold the external antenna when the phone is IN USE. Holding the external antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than needed. In addition, use of unauthorised antennas may result in non-compliance with the local regulatory requirements in your country.

## Facilities

Turn off your phone in any facility where posted notices instruct you to do so. These facilities may include hospitals or health care facilities that may be using equipment that is sensitive to external RF energy.

## Aircraft

When instructed to do so, turn off your phone when on board an aircraft. Any use of a phone must be in accordance with applicable regulations per airline crew instructions.

## Medical Devices

## Pacemakers

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 inches ( 15 centimetres) be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker.
Persons with pacemakers should:

- ALWAYS keep the phone more than 6 inches ( 15 centimetres) from your pacemaker when the phone is turned ON.
- NOT carry the phone in the breast pocket.
- Use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimise the potential for interference.
- Turn OFF the phone immediately if you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.


## Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

## Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from RF energy. Your GP may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

## Phone Operation

When placing or receiving a phone call, hold your phone as you would a wireline telephone.

## Body-Worn Operation

To maintain compliance with RF energy exposure guidelines, if you wear a phone on your body when transmitting, always place the phone in a Motorola-supplied or approved clip, holder, holster, case, or body harness for this phone, if available. Use of accessories not approved by Motorola may exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. If you do not use one of the body-worn accessories approved or supplied by Motorola, and are not using the phone held in the normal use position, ensure the phone and its antenna are at least 1 inch ( 2.5 centimetres) from your body when transmitting.

## Data Operation

When using any data feature of the phone, with or without an accessory cable, position the phone and its antenna at least 1 inch ( 2.5 centimetres) from your body.

## Approved Accessories

Use of accessories not approved by Motorola, including but not limited to batteries and antenna, may cause your phone to exceed RF energy exposure guidelines. For a list of approved Motorola accessories, visit our website at www. Motorola. com.

## RF Energy Interference/Compatibility

Note: Nearly every electronic device is susceptible to RF energy interference from external sources if inadequately shielded, designed, or otherwise configured for RF energy compatibility. In some circumstances your phone may cause interference.

## Use While Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of phones in the area where you drive. Always obey them.
When using your phone while driving, please:

- Give full attention to driving and to the road.
- Use hands-free operation, if available.
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions so require.


## Operational Warnings

## For Vehicles With an Air Bag

Do not place a phone in the area over an air bag or in the air bag deployment area. Air bags inflate with great force. If a phone is placed in the air bag deployment area and the air bag inflates, the phone may be propelled with great force and cause serious injury to occupants of the vehicle.

## Potentially Explosive Atmospheres

Turn off your phone prior to entering any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere, unless it is a phone type especially qualified for use in such areas and certified as "Intrinsically Safe." Do not remove, install, or charge batteries in such areas. Sparks in a potentially explosive atmosphere can cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.
Note: The areas with potentially explosive atmospheres referred to above include fuelling areas such as below decks on boats, fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities, areas where the air contains chemicals or particles, such as grain, dust, or metal powders. Areas with potentially explosive atmospheres are often but not always posted.

## Blasting Caps and Areas

To avoid possible interference with blasting operations, turn OFF your phone when you are near electrical blasting caps, in a blasting area, or in areas posted "Turn off electronic devices." Obey all signs and instructions.

## Batteries

Batteries can cause property damage and/or bodily injury such as burns if a conductive material such as jewellery, keys, or beaded chains touch exposed terminals. The conductive material may complete an electrical circuit (short circuit) and become quite hot. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult with your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a blinkinglights feature on your phone. (The blinking-light feature is not available on all products.)
Parents should monitor their children's use of video game or other features that incorporate blinking lights on the phones. All persons should discontinue use and consult a doctor if any of the following symptoms occur: convulsion, eye or muscle twitching, loss of awareness, involuntary movements, or disorientation.
To limit the likelihood of such symptoms, please take the following safety precautions:

- Do not play or use a blinking-lights feature if you are tired or need sleep.
- Take a minimum of a 15 -minute break hourly.
- Play in a room in which all lights are on.
- Play at the farthest distance possible from the screen.


## Repetitive Motion Injuries

When you play games on your phone, you may experience occasional discomfort in your hands, arms, shoulders, neck, or other parts of your body. Follow these instructions to avoid problems such as tendonitis, carpal tunnel syndrome, or other musculoskeletal disorders:

- Take a minimum 15-minute break every hour of game playing.
- If your hands, wrists, or arms become tired or sore while playing, stop and rest for several hours before playing again.
- If you continue to have sore hands, wrists, or arms during or after play, stop playing and see a doctor.

## Optional Features

## Optional Accessories

## Installing the SIM Card

Your Subscriber Identity Module (SIM) card contains your phone number, service details, and phonebook/message memory.
Caution: Do not bend or scratch your SIM card. Avoid exposing your SIM card to static electricity, water, or dirt.


## Installing a Memory Card

You can install a removable memory card in your phone. You can store additional multimedia objects (such as photos and sounds) on the memory card.

Caution: Do not bend or scratch your memory card. Avoid exposing your memory card to static electricity, water, or dirt.


## Battery Use

Battery performance depends on many factors, including your wireless carrier's network configuration; signal strength; the temperature at which you operate your phone; the features and/or settings you select and use; items attached to the phone's
accessory connector; and your voice, data, and other application usage patterns.
Caution: To prevent injuries or burns, do not allow metal objects to contact or short-circuit the battery terminals.

To maximise your battery's performance:

- Always use Motorola Original batteries and battery chargers. The phone warranty does not cover damage caused from using non-Motorola batteries and/or battery chargers.
- New batteries or batteries that have been stored for a long time may require a longer charge time.
- Maintain the battery at or near room temperature when charging
- Do not expose batteries to temperatures below $-10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(14^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$ or above $45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$. Always take your phone with you when you leave your vehicle.
- When you do not intend to use a battery for a while, store it uncharged in a cool, dark, dry place, such as a refrigerator.
- Batteries gradually wear down and require longer charging times. This is normal. If you charge your battery regularly and notice a decrease in talk time or an increase in charging time, then it is probably time to purchase a new battery.

The rechargeable batteries that power this phone must be disposed of properly and may need to be recycled. Refer to your battery's label for battery type. Contact your local recycling centre for proper disposal methods.
Warning: Never dispose of batteries in a fire because they may explode.

## Charging the Battery

New batteries are shipped partially charged. Before you can use your phone, you need to install and charge the battery as described below. Some batteries perform best after several full charge/discharge cycles.

## Action

1 Insert the travel charger plug into your phone with the release tab facing up. Make sure that both of the plug's connector hooks engage to lock the plug in place.


Note: It may take up to 10
seconds for your phone to provide a visible or audible indication that the battery is charging.
2 Plug the other end of the travel charger into the appropriate electrical outlet.

3 When your phone indicates Charge Complete, press the release tab and remove the travel charger.

Tip: You can safely leave the travel charger connected to the phone after charging is complete. This will not damage the battery.

## Installing the Battery

Your phone is designed to use only Motorola Original batteries and accessories. We recommend that you store batteries in their protective cases when not in use.

## Notes:

- Your phone battery may be enclosed in a protective clear plastic case. Remove the battery from the case before attempting to install it.
- Your phone is shipped with a protective clear plastic liner covering the battery door latch. Remove the liner to ensure that the battery door attaches and closes properly.

Note: It may take up to 4 seconds for the display to illuminate after you turn the phone on.


2 If necessary, enter your SIM card PIN code and press OK ( $\cdot$ ) to unlock the SIM card.
Caution: If you enter an incorrect PIN code 3 times in a row, your SIM card is disabled and your phone displays SIM Blocked.
3 If necessary, enter your 4-digit unlock code and press OK ( $\square$ ) to unlock the phone.

Note: At startup, you are prompted to personalise your phone. Select YES $(\checkmark)$ to set personal phone options, or NO ( $\square$ ) to go to the idle display. For more information about personalising your phone, see page 82.

## Adjusting Volume

Press the volume key up or down to:

- increase or decrease earpiece volume during a call
- increase or decrease the ringer volume when the home screen is visible
Tip: At the lowest volume setting, press the volume key down once to switch to vibrate alert. Press it down again to switch to silent alert. Press the volume key up to switch back to vibrate alert, then ring alert.

## Selecting a Feature Option

## Tap Mode Text Entry Rules

## Changing a Code, PIN, or Password

Your phone's 4-digit unlock code is originally set to 1234, and the 6 -digit security code is originally set to 000000 . Your service provider may reset these codes before you receive your phone.
If your service provider has not reset these codes, we recommend that you change them to prevent others from accessing your personal information. The unlock code must contain 4 digits, and the security code must contain 6 digits.

## This model phone meets international standards for exposure to radio waves

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed limits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organisations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. The guidelines include a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.
The exposure standard for mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. Under the guidelines for your phone model, the SAR limit is 2.0 W/kg. ${ }^{1}$ Tests for SAR are conducted in accordance with CENELEC ${ }^{2}$ testing procedures using standard operating positions with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a base station, the lower the power output of the phone.
Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it is tested to confirm compliance with the guidelines. The tests are performed in positions that conform to a uniform testing methodology determined by an expert standards body. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is: $1.01 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}{ }^{3}{ }^{3}$

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the governmental requirements for safe exposure. Please note that improvements to this product model could cause differences in the SAR value for later products; in all cases, products are designed to be within the guidelines.
