## Baddight:

The display is illuminated by a baddight. When you press any key, the baddight illuminates. It tums off if no key is pressed within a given period of time, depending on the Back Light option in the Phone Settings menu.

To spedify the length of time for which the baddight is adive, set the Back Light menu option (461); see page 92 for further details.

## Senvice Light:

The service light is in the top right-hand comer of the phone. It flashes when services are available on the phone.

To activate or deactivate use of the service light, set the Sevice Lightmenu qption (462); see page 92 for further details.


## Getting Started

## Installing the SIM Card

When you subscribe to a cellular network, you are provided with a plug-in SIM card loaded with your subscription details (PIN, optional services available and so on).

Important: The plug-in SIM card and its contacts can be easily damaged by scratches or bending, so be careful when handling, inserting or removing the card.

Keep all SIM cards out of the reach of small children.

1. If necessary, switch off the phone by holding down the $\mathbf{\Delta} /(1)$ key until the power-off animation is displayed
2. Remove the battery. To do so:
(1) Slide the catch above the battery toward the top of the phone and hold it in the position.
(2) Lift the battery away, as shown.

3. Slide the SIM card into the SIM card holder so that the holder lodks the card in position.


Noter When you need to remove the SIM card, slide it, as shown and take it out of the holder.

4. Insert the tabs on the battery into the notches on the base of the phone.

5. Push the battery down until it dids into place. Make sure that the battery is properly installed before switching on the phone.


## Charging a Bathery

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion battery. A travel adapter and a desktop charger are provided with your phone. Use only approved batteries and chargers. Ask your local SAMSUNG dealer for further details.

The phone can be used while the battery is charging.

Note: You must fully charge the battery before using your phone for the first time. A discharged battery is fully recharged in approximately 200 minutes.

## Cherging with the Tiranel Ackpter

Using the travel adapter, you can charge the battery attached to the phone.

1. With the battery in position on the phone, connect the lead from the traved adapter to the bottom of the phone. Check that the arrow on the lead connector is facing towards the front of the phone.

2. Connect the adapter to a standard $A C$ wall outlet.

You can see the bar in the display indicating the charging progress.
3. When charging is finished, disconnect the adapter from the power outlet and from the phone by pressing the gray tabs on both sides of the connector and pulling the connector out.


## Cherging with the Desktop Cherger

Using the desktop charger, you can charge the battery alone.

1. Connect the lead from the travel adapter to the connector at the bottom of the charger.

2. Insert the battery al one into the slot of the desktop charger ensuring the teminals on the battery contading with those on the charger and push it down until it dids into place.

3. Cormect the adapter to a standard AC wall outet.

You can see the LED on the charger indicating the charging progress with the following color:

- Redt the battery is charging
- Green: charging is completed

4. When charging is finished, take the battery out of the desktop charger.

5. Disconnect the adapter fromboth the power outlet and the charger.


## Law Bethery Incicatior

When the battery is weak and only a few minutes of talktime remain, you will hear a waming tone and a message will be repeated at regular intervals on the display.


When the battery becomes too weak for the phone to operate, it switches off automatically.

## Snitdingthe Phane On Off

1. Open the phone.
2. Hold down the $/$ (1) key for more than one second to switch the phone on.
3. If the phone asks for a password, key in the password and press the OKsoft key. The phone password is factory set to 00000000. For further details, see page 127.
4. If the phone asks for a PIN, key in the PIN and press the OKsoft key. For further details, see page 127.

The phone searches for your network and when it finds it, the ide screen, illustrated below, is displayed. Now, you can make or receive a call.

- The display language is factory set to English. To change the language, use the Language menu option (45); for further details, refer to page 92

1. If necessary, open the flip cover. Press the key or the Accept soft key to answer the incoming call.

If the Anykey Answer menu option (49) is set to ON, you can press any key to answer a call except for the $\mathbf{A} /(1)$ key and the Rejectsoft key (see page 94).

Notes:

- To reject an incoming call, press and hold the volume keys on the left side of the phone without opening the flip.
- If the Active Fipmenu option (48) is set to Enalle, you do not need to press any key. You can answer the call simply by opening the flip (see page 93).

## Viewing Missed Calls

If you are unable to answer a call for any reason, you can find out who was calling you, provided that this service is available. In this way, you can call the person badk, if necessary.

## Phonebook

You can store phone numbers and their corresponding names in the memory of your SIM card. In addition, you can store up to 99 numbers and names in the phone memory. The SIM card and phone memories, although physically separate, are used as if they were a single entity, called the phonebook.

## Storing a Phone Number with a Nante

As soon as you start to enter a number, Save appears above the left soft key to allow you to store the number in the phonebook

## Caller Group

You can set the phone to ring in a spedific way and display a preselected graphic icon when a particular person calls you. To do so, you must:

## Chenging Text Inat Mock

When you are in a field that allows character entry, you should notice the text input mode indicator at the bottom of the display.


You can change between Chinese input methods, and English or to numbers input. To change to another text input mode:

2. Scroll to the desired mode with the $\boldsymbol{\Delta}$ and $\nabla$ keys.

This mode allows you to enter Pinyin charaders with only one key press per letter. When the phone is in the Pinyin mode, keys behave as follows:

Press the $\mathbf{C}$ key one or more times to remove strokes to the left．Once the Keystroke Area is empty，pressing the $\mathbf{C}$ key removes characters fromthe Text Area．

## Rapid Cheracher Entry

Rapid character entry is easy in any mode，using the Character Selection Map．As you enter characters， your phone predicts the next character you might want and presents choices in the Character Selection Map area．When a desired character appears，you may select it as described on page 47.

For example，if you type the word＂Jhong guo（中国）＂ and enter the first character using the following keystrokes；9，4，6，6，1，and 7，you do not have to complete the Pinyin spelling to indude＂guo（国）＂． With no extra typing，the character is displayed comeniently in the Character Selection Map for you to choose．

## Chinese Strole Mode

This mode allows you to enter individual Chinese strokes，in written order－fromtop to bottom and from left to right．Your phone provides Chinese Simplified Stroke mode and Chinese Traditional Stroke mode．

The two modes work similarly，but the characters that appear in the display may differ．

Even though there are many different strokes used to create Chinese characters，the strokes are dassified into 5 basic categories；heng，shu，pie，dian and the． The basic strokes are printed on the keypad，on keys 1to 5

To enter a stroke，press the key printed with the stroke that most dosely represents the exact stroke you desire．The table shows the stroke／key relationship：

## Typing Stoles and Charachers in Strole Mode

2．The phone displays your strokes in the Key Stroke Area and offers character choices in the Character Selection Map．As you enter strokes，notice that the choices in the Character Selection Map change．To scroll through dhoices in the Character Selection Map，press the $\mathbf{V}$ key．To move badk，press the 4 key．

3．When the character you are typing appears in the Character Selection Map，you may select it without finishing the stroke sequence for the character． Characters displayed in the Character Selection Map correspond to keys 7 to $*$ on the keypad．To select a character fromthe Character Selection Map and add it to your message，press the corresponding key 7 to＊．

Noter If you are uncertain of the order of one or more strokes，press the 6 key in place of each questionable stroke Continue entering strokes until the character is displayed in the Character Selection Map or until you have finished the character．

## Sarolling

To move the cursor left or right through your text message，press the $\mathbf{4}$ or key．

## Cearing Letters and Worchs

Press the $\mathbf{C}$ key one or more times to remove strokes to the left．Once the Stroke Area is empty，pressing the $\mathbf{C}$ key removes characters fromthe Text Area．

## Rapid Cheracter Entry

Rapid character entry is easy in any mode，using the Character Selection Map．As you enter characters， your phone predicts the next character you might want and presents choices in the Character Selection Map area．When a desired character appears，you may select it as described above．

In most cases，you will see the desired character in the Character Selection Map area before you have entered all of the strokes to build it．

For example，try typing the twelve stroke character pair＂中国＂using the following keystrokes；28 8and 7．Even though＂中国＂is a twelve stroke character pair，your phone enables you to type it in only three key presses！

## Quick English Mode

This mode allows you to enter English words with only one keypress per letter. Each key on a keypad has more than one letter - a single press on the 5 key could beJ, K, or L The Quick English mode automatically compares your key presses to an intemal Quick English linguistic database to detemine the correct word.

The mode requires far fewer keystrokes than the traditional multi-tap method; English mode.

## Typing English Worck

To type a word, press keys corresponding to the letters you need. Remember the following as you are typing:

1. Press keys on the handset just once per desired letter. For example, to enter 'hello', press 4 aiin, उ36. (5.ix) , 5国, 6 mis.
2. The word you are typing appears in the display. It may change with each key you press.
3. Type to the end of the word before editing or deleting any keystrokes.
4. Complete each word with a space by pressing the \# key.

If the word that appears in the display is not the word that you desire, press the $\mathbf{O}$ key one or more times to display altemate word choices for the keys you have typed. (For example, 'of' and 'me' both shares the sequence 6, 3 The phone displays the most commonly used choice first.)

To type words not found in the phone database, change the text input mode to English mode.

## Snart Punduations

Period, hyphen, and apostrophe are available on the $\mathbf{1}$ key. 19 applies rules of grammar to insert the correct punctuation. Notice that the $\mathbf{1}$ key is used twice in this example to display two punctuation marks:


## Upper Case Letters

There are two shift states: Lower Case and Caps Lock Press the * key one or more times to display the appropriate shift indicator, and begin typing nomally.

## Sarolling

- To move the cursor left or right through your text message, press the $\mathbf{4}$ or key.
- To scroll through altemate word choices for the keys you have entered, press the Okey.


## Gearing Lethers and Words

Press the $C$ key one or more times to remove letters to the left. Press and hold the $C$ key to erase entire words.

## English Mode

When typing in English mode, you should press key labelled with the required character:
-Once for the first character
-Twice for the second character and so on

For example, you press the $\mathbf{2}$ key three times quiddy to display the character " $C$ ', the $\mathbf{5}$ key two times quiddy to display the character " $L$ ". So, this method is called Multi-tap typing.

The cursor moves to the right when you press a different key. When entering the same character twice (or a different character on the same key), just wait for a few seconds for the cursor to move right automatically, and select the next character.

Complete each word with a space by pressing the \# key.

To move the cursor left or right through your text message, press the $\mathbf{4}$ or key.

Press the $C$ key one or more times to remove letters to the left. Press and hold the $C$ key to erase entire words.

## In-Call Options

## Nunlber Mode

Number mode enables you to enter numbers into a text message. Press keys corresponding to the desired digits, and manually switch badk to the text entry mode of choice.

## Synbolic Made

Symbolic mode enables you to enter symbols into a text message

## Using Help

On-screen help is avai lable by selecting Help from the Mode menu. Use the $\boldsymbol{\Delta}$ and $\boldsymbol{\nabla}$ keys to scroll through the Help information.

Your phone provides a number of control functions that you can use during a call.

## Pulting a Call on Hold

You can place the current call on hold whenever you want. You can make another call while you have a call in progress if this senvice is supported by the network Of these two calls, one is adive and the other is on hold and you can swap between the calls.

To place a call on hold, simply press the Hold soft key. You can readivate the call whenever you want, by pressing the Unhold soft key.

To make a call while you have a call in progress, proceed as follows.

1. Key in the phone number that you wish to dial or look it up in the phonebook.
2. Press the keyto dial the second call.

The first call is automatically put on hold.

Or altematively, proceed as follows.

1. Put the current call on hold by pressing the Hold soft key.
2. Make the second call in the normal way.

To swap between the two calls, simply press the Swap soft key.

The current call is placed on hold and the call on hold is readivated so that you can continue conversing with the other party.

When you have finished, end each call nomally by pressing the $\mathbf{A} /(1)$ key

## Switching the Miarodhane Off (Mute)

You can temporarily switch your phone's microphone off, so that the other party cannot hear you.

Example: You wish to say something to another person in the roombut do not want the other party to hear you

To switch the microphone off temporarily, proceed as follows.

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. If necessary, press the $\nabla$ key to highlight the Mute option
3. Press the OKsoft key.

The other party can no longer hear you.

To switch the microphone badk on, proceed as follows.

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. If necessary, press the $\nabla$ key to highlight the Unmute option.
3. Press the OKsoft key.

The other party can hear you again

## Muling Sending Key Tönes

These options allow you to turn the key tones off or on If the Mute keys option is selected, your phone does not transmit the key tones. It allows you to press keys without hearing annoying key tones during a call.

Noter To communicate with answering machines or computerised telephony systems, the Send keys option must be selected.

## Searding fior a Number in the Phanalook

You can seardh for a number in the phonebook during a call.

1. Press the Options soft key.
2. Press the $\nabla$ key to highlight the Phonelbook option
3. Press the OK soft key.

The phonebook entries are listed.
4. Enter the name that you wish to find.

If you enter the start of the name, all phonebook entries are listed, starting with the first entry matching your input. The entry is also highlighted.
5. To view the highlighted entry, press the View soft key.

For a more detailed description of the Phonebook feature, refer to page 34.

## Using the SMS Senvice

If you receive an SMS (Short Message Service) message during a call, the message icon ( $\Delta$ ) flashes in the display. The SMS Senvice option enables you to use this feature

Read Messages: allows you to read the messages that you have received.

Write Messages: allows you to write a message.

For further details on the SMS senvice, refer to page 76.

## Answering a Secand Call

You can answer an incoming call while you have a call in progress, if this service is supported by the network and you have set the Call Vaiting menu option (7.3) to Activate (see page 112). You will be notified of an incoming call by a call waiting tone

To answer a call while you have a call in progress, proceed as follows.

1. Press the key to answer the incoming call.

The first call is automatically put on hold.
2. To switch between the two calls, press the Swap soft key.

To end a held call, press the Options soft key and select the End Held Call option
3. To end the current call, press the $\mathbf{A} /$ (1) key.

## Malking a Mutiparty Call

A multiparty call is a network senvice that allows up to six people to take part simultaneously in a multiparty or conference call. For more infornation, contact your senvice provider.

## Setting upthe Mutiparty Call

1. Call the first participant in the normal way.
2. Call the second participant in the nommal way. The first call is automatically put on hold.
3. To join the first participant to the multiparty call, press the Options soft key and select the J oin option
4. To add a new person to the miltiparty call, call the person in the normal way, press the Options soft key and select the J oin option

You can add incoming callers by answering the call and pressing Options, followed byJ oin Repeat as required.

## Having a Private Conversation With One Participart

1. Press the Options soft key and choose the Select one option.
The list of call participants appears.
2. Highlight the required person, by pressing the 4
or $\bar{\nabla}$ key, followed by the Select soft key or the $\sim$ key.
3. Select Private

Now you can tall p privately with that person. The other participants can continue to converse with each other:
4. To retum to the multiparty call, press the Options soft key and select J oin

All the multiparty call participants can now hear each other.

## Dropping One Participant

1. Press the Options soft key and choose the Select one option
The list of call participants appears.
2. Highlight the required person, by pressing the 4 or $\nabla$ key, followed by the Select soft key or the P key.
3. Select Remove.

The call is ended with that participant, but you can continue to tall $k$ with the other participants.
4. End the multiparty call by dosing the phone or pressing the $\mathbf{\triangle} / \mathbb{D}$ key.

## Using the Menus

The phone offers a range of functions that allow you to tailor the phone to your needs. These fundions are arranged in menus and sub-menus.

The menus and sub-menus can be accessed by using the navigation keys or by using the index system

## Accessing a Menu Fundion by Sarolling

1. In ide mode, press the Memu soft key to access the menufacility. Scroll with the $\mathbf{\Delta}$ and $\boldsymbol{\nabla}$ keys to reach the desired main menu, eg. Phone Settings. Press the Selectsoft key to enter the menu.
2. If the menu contains any submenus: for example, Language, find the one you want by scrolling with the $\Delta$ and $\nabla$ keys. Press the Select soft key to enter the submenu.

If the menu you have selected contains submenus, repeat this step.
3. Scroll with the $\mathbf{\Delta}$ and $\nabla$ keys to find the setting of your choice. Press the Selectsoft key to confirm the chosen setting.

## Notes:

- You can return the previous menu level by pressing the 9 soft key.
- You can exit the menu without changing the menu settings by pressing the $\mathbf{\Delta} /$ (1) key.


## Accessing a Menu Fundion by Using its Shortalt

The menu iterss (menu, submenus and setting options) are numbered and can be accessed quiddy by using their shortat number. The shortat number is shown in the right-bottomnext to the 9 soft key on the display.

The SMS (Short Message Senvice) function is a network sevice and may not be supported by your network Messages can be sent by text, fax, Email and paging messaging systems, provided that these senvices are supported by your network To send text messages by phone, you must obtain the number of the SMS centre fromyour sevice provider.

When the icon appears, you have received new text messages. If the message memory is full, an error message is displayed and you cannot receive any new messages. Use the Deleke option in the Read
Messages menu (21) to delete obsolete messages.

There are several access codes that are used by your phone and its SIM card. These codes help you protect the phone against unauthorised use.

## PUKcode

The PUK (Personal Unblodking Key) code is required to change a blocked PIN code. The PUKcode may be supplied with the SIM card. If not, contact your local senvice provider for the code.

If you key in an incorrect PUK code ten times in succession, the SIM card cannot be used anymore Contact your senvice provider for a new card.

You cannot change the PUK code. If you lose the code, contact your service provider.

## PUR code

The PUK2 code, supplied with some SIM cards, is required to change a blocked PIN2 code.

If you key in an incorrect PUK2 code ten times in succession, you cannot use the fundions requining the PIN2 code. Contact your senvice provider for a new card.

You cannot change the PUK2 code. If you lose the code, contact your sevice provider.

## Health and Safety Information

## Exposure to Radio Frequency (Ri) Signals

Your mobile phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission linits for exposure to radio frequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission of the U.S. Govemment. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish perritted levels of RF energy for the general population Those guidelines are consistent with the safety standard previously set by both U.S. and intemational standards bodies:

- American National Standards Institute (ANSI) IEIE C95.1-1992
- National Coundil on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP). Report 86
- Intemational Commission on Non-lonizing Radiation Protection (ICNIRP) 1996
- Ministry of Health (Canada), Safety Code 6.

The standards indude a substantial safety margin designed to assure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Spedific Absonption Rate, or SAR The SAR limit set by the FCC is $10 W / \mathrm{kg}$.*

[^3]Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions spedified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power leved in all tested frequency bands. Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operation can be well below the maximumalue. This is because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network In general, the doser you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the linit established by the govemment-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (eg., at the ear and wom on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. (Body-wom measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and FCC requirements). While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the goverment requirement for safety exposure.

For body wom operation, to maintain compliance with FCCRF exposure guidelines, use only Samsungapproved accessories. When carrying the phone while it is on, use the specific Samsung belt-dip that has been tested for compliance.

Use of non-SAMSUNG-approved accessories may violate FCCRF exposure guidelines and should be avoided

## Precautians When Using Batteries

Your phone is powered by a rechargeable Li-ion standard battery.

- Never use any charger or battery that is damaged in any way.
- Use the battery only for its intended purpose.
- If you use the phone near the network's base station, it uses less power, talk and standby times are greatl $y$ affected by the signal strength on the cellular network and the parameters set by the network operator.
- Battery charging times depend on the remaining battery charge and the type of battery and charger used. The battery can be charged and discharged hundreds of tirres, but it will gradually wear out. When the operation time (talk time and standby time) is noticeably shorter than normal, it is time to buy a new battery.
- If left unused, a fully charged battery will discharge itself over time.
- Use only Samsung-approved batteries and recharge your battery only with Samsung-approved chargers. When a charger is not in use, disconnect it from the power source. Do not leave the battery connected to a charger for more than a week, since overcharging may shorten its life
- Extreme temperatures will affect the charging capacity of your battery: it may require cooling or warming first.
- Do not leave the battery in hot or cold places, such as in a car in summer or winter conditions, as you will reduce the capadity and life-time of the battery. Always try to keep the battery at roomtemperature A phone with a hot or cold battery may temporarily not work, even when the battery is fully charged. $\dot{L}$ ion batteries are particularly affected by temperatures below $\mathrm{O}^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$.
- Do not short-dircuit the battery. Acaidental short circuiting can occur when a metallic object (coin, dip or pen) causes a direct connection between the tand - terminals of the battery (metal strips on the back of the battery), for example when you carry a spare battery in a pocket or bag. Short-circuiting the terminals may damage the battery or the object causing the short-cirait.
- Dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations. Always recyde Do not dispose of batteries in a fire.


## Raad Safiety

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice-almost anywhere, anytime But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. If available, these features help you to place your call without taking your attention off the road.
2. When available, use a hands-free device. If possible, add an additional layer of convenience and safety to your wireless phone with one of the many hands-free accessories available today.
3. Position your wireless phone within easy reach. Be able to access your wireless phone without removing your eyes fromthe road. If you get an incoming call at an inconverient time, if possible, let your voice mail answer it for you.
4. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, ice, and even heavy traffic can be hazardous.
5. Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. J otting down a "to do" list or flipping through your address book takes attention away fromyour primary responsibility, driving safely.
6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan calls when your car will be stationary. If you need to make a call while moving, dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, and continue.
7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distrading. Make people you are talling with aware you are driving and suspend conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Dial 9-1-1 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic acdident or medical emergendies. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone!
9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergendies. If you see an auto acdident, dime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 9-1-1 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
10. Call roadside assistance or a spedial nonerrergencies wireless assistance number when necessary. If you see a broken-down vehide posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehide you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.

## Operating Envirannent

Remember to follow any spedial regulations in force in any area and always switch off your phone whenever it is forbidden to use it, or when it may cause interference of danger.

When conneding the phone or any accessory to another device, read its user's quide for detailed safety instructions. Do not connect incompatible products.

As with other mobile radio transmitting equipment, users are adkised that for the satisfactory operation of the equipment and for the safety of personnel, it is recommended that the equipment should only be used in the nomal operating position (held to your ear with the antenna pointing over your shoulder).

## Eedraric Devices

Most modem electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency $(\mathrm{RF})$ signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals fromyour wireless phone.

## Pacenalears

Pacemaker manufacturers recommend that a minimum separation of 6 indhes ( 20 cm ) be maintained between a hand-held wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Tednology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should always keep the phone more than 6 indhes ( 15 an ) from their pacemaker when the phone is switched on;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference.
- If you have any reason to suspect that interference is taking place, switch off your phone immediately.


## Hearing Aicls

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss altematives.

## OHher Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to detemine if they are adequately shied ded fromextemal RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information Switch off your phone in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to extemal RF energy.

## Vehides

RF signals may affect improperly install led or inadequately shied ded electronic systems in motor vehides. Chedk with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehide You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehide.

## Posted Facilities

Switch off your phone in any facility where posted notices so require

## Potentially Explosive Atmoppheres

Switch off your phone when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death

Users are advised to switch off the phone while at a refueling point (service station). Users are reminded of the need to obseve restrictions on the use of radio equipment in fuel depots (fuel storage and distribution areas), cherrical plants or where blasting operations are in progress.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often but not al ways dearly marked. They ind ude below deck on boats; cherical transfer or storage facilities; vehides using liquefied petroleumgas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chericals or partides, such as grain, dust or metal powders; and any other area where you would nomally be advised to tum off your vehide engine.

## Vehides

Only qualified personnel should service the phone, or install the phone in a vehide. Faulty installation or service may be dangerous and may invalidate any warranty which may apply to the unit.

Check regularly that all mobile phone equipment on your vehide is mounted and operating properly.

Do not store or carry flammable liquids, gases or explosive materials in the same compartment as the phone, its parts or accessories.

For vehides equipped with an air bag, remember that an air bag inflates with great force. Do not place objects, induding both installed or portable wireless equipment in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehide wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Switch off your phone before boarding an aircraft. The use of mobile phones in an aircraft may be dangerous to the operation of the aircraft, disupt the wireless telephone network and may be illegal.

Failure to obsenve these instructions may lead to the suspension or denial of telephone services to the offender, or legal action, or both.

## Encrgengy Calls

## Important

This phone, like any mobile phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and land ine networks as well as user-programmed fundions which cannot guarantee connection in all conditions. Therefore, you should never rely solely upon any wireless phone for essential commuications (for example, medical emergencies).

Remember, to make or receive any calls the phone must be switched on and in a service area with adequate signal strength. Emergency calls may not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when cetain network senices and/or phone features are in use. Chedk with local senvice providers.

## To make an emergency call:

1. If the phone is not on, switch it on
2. Key in the emergency number for your present location (for example, 911 or other official emergency number). Emergency numbers vary by location.
3. Press $<\gg$

If certain features are in use (keyguard, restrict calls, etc.), you may first need to tum those features off before you can make an emergency call. Consult this document and your local cellular sevice provider.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your phone may be the only means of commuication at the scene of an accident - do not aut off the call until given perrission to do so.

## Care and Mintenance

Your phone is a product of superior design and craftsmanship and should be treated with care. The suggestions below will help you to fulfill any warranty obligations and allow you to enjoy this product for many years. When using your phone, battery, charger, OR any accessory:

- Keep it and all its parts and accessories out of small children's reach.
- Keep it dry. Precipitation, humidity and liquids contain minerals that will corrode electronic ciraits.
- Do not use or store it in dusty, dirty areas as its moving parts can be damaged.
- Do not store it in hot areas. High temperatures can shorten the life of electronic devices, damage batteries, and warp or melt certain plastics.
- Do not store it in cold areas. When the phone wams up (to its nomal operating temperature), moisture can forminside the phone, which may damage the phone's electronic cirait boards.
- Do not drop, knodk or shake it. Rough handling can break intemal circuit boards.


## Glossary

- Do not use harsh cherricals, deaning solvents, or strong detergents to dean it. Wipe it with a soft doth slightly dampened in a mild soap-and-water solution.
- Do not paint it. Paint can dog the device's moving parts and prevent proper operation.
- Use only the supplied or an approved replacement anterna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications of attadments could damage the phone and may violate regulations goveming radio devices.
- If the phone, battery, charger, or any accessory is not working properly, take it to your nearest qualified service facility. The personnel there will assist you, and if necessary, arrange for service.

To help you understand the main tednical terms and abbreviations used in this booklet and take full advantage of the features on your mobile phone, here are a few definitions.

## Adive Fip

Ability to answer a call simply by opering the phone.

## Call Barring

Ability to restrict outgoing and incoming calls.

## Gall Diverting

Ability to reroute calls to another number.

## Call Halding

Ability to put one call on standby while answering or making another call; you can then switch between the two calls, as required.

## Call Maiting

Ability to informusers that they have an incoring call when engaged on another call.

## DCS

Digital cellular network standard based on the GSM network architecture With the higher frequency range ( $1800 \mathrm{MH} z$ for DCS instead of $900 \mathrm{MH} z$ for GSM), more radio channels can be made available, thus allowing the network to support more subsaibers and traffic.

## Dual Band

Ability to operate with both DCS (1800 MHz) and GSM $(900 \mathrm{MHz})$ networks. The phone automatically uses the network with the strongest signal and even switches networks during a call within the same operator's network

## GSM (Golal Systemfior Mabile Cammenicalion)

Intemational standard for cellular communication, guaranteeing compatibility between the various network operators. GSM covers most European countries and many other parts of the world.

## Line Identificalion Senvices (Galler ID)

Senices allowing subsaibers to view or block the telephone numbers of callers.

## Multiparty Calling

Ability to establish a conference call innolving up to five additional parties.

## Phone Passuard

Searity code used to unlock the phone when you have selected the option to lock it automatically each time it switches on.

## PIN (Persanal Identificatian Nunber)

Security code that protects the phone against unauthorised use. The PIN is supplied by the service provider with the SIM card. It may be a four to eightdigit number and can be changed, as required.

## PUK (PIN Undodking Key)

Searity code used to unlodk the phone when an incorrect PIN has been entered three times in succession The eight-digit number is supplied by the service provider with the SIM card.

## Roaning

Use of your phone when you are outside your home area (when travelling for example).

## SDN (Senvice Dialling Numbers)

Telephone numbers supplied by your network provider and giving access to spedial services, such as voice mail, directory inquiries, austomer support and emergency senvices.

## SM (Subsariber Identification Module)

Card containing a dhip with all the information required to operate the phone (network and memory information, as well as the subscriber's personal data). The SIM card fits into a small slot on the back of the phone and is protected by the battery.

## SMS (Shart Message Senvice)

Network service sending and receiving messages to and fromanother subsciber without having to speak to the correspondent. The ressage created or received (up to 160 characters long) can be displayed, received, edited or sent.

## Soft Keys

Two keys ( - ) on the phone, the purpose of which:

- Varies according to the fundion that you are currently using
- Is indicated on the bottomline of the cisplay just above the corresponding key


## Voice Mail

Computerised answering service that automatically answers your calls when you are not available, plays a greeting (optionally in your own voice) and records a message.
